I Edward W. Pelletier of the County of Carters and State of North Carolina, being in health of body and of sound mind and memory and considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make public and declare this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say:
First: That my executors hereinafter named, one or both, shall provide for my body a decent burial in a simple and unostentatious manner, and pay all my funeral expenses, including a simple monument or tombstone to mark my resting place and to pay all of my just debts to whomsoever owing out of the first money which shall come into their hands as a part of my estate.

Second: I desire that my body be laid to rest on Mr. William Fisher's plantation in a spot selected to be selected by him for his own burial.
