do make, publish and declare this my last Will and Testament;

First-

I devise to Annie R. Morse, my daughter, the "Old Homestead", or dwelling house and lot corner of Moore Street and Ann Street, Beaufort, North Carolina, in which I now reside; said "Homestead" being the half lots Nos 39 and 40, Old Town, conveyed to me by the clerk and Master in Equity June 14, 1834, except that part of said half lots 39 and 40 herein devised to Mary Eliza Summers.

To Have & Hold, to said Annie R. Morse and her heirs and assigns forever.

Second I also devise unto said Annie R. Morse her heirs and assigns my stone building on the West side of Inner Street, known as part lot (14) Division Old Town Beaufort North Carolina; being same part lot and improvements conveyed to me Feb'y 2nd 1861 by C. L. Dickinson and wife by deed recorded in Book N. H. page 98 in the office of the Register of Deeds for Carteret Co said state.

Third:

I devise unto my daughter Mary Eliza Summers of Philadelphia, Penna. the dwelling house and lot on Ann Street, Beaufort North Carolina, adjoining the Old Homestead and between the Parsonage Lot and Old Homestead, being all that part of the half lots 39 and 40, to wit: Beginning in the Parsonage or W. S. Chadwick's eastern line, on Ann Street and running East thirty seven (37) feet on Ann Street, then South along the line of the Old Homestead to the back line of the half lots 39 & 40 aforesaid, then West to the Parsonage line & then North with said Parsonage line to the beginning.

Fourth: I give, bequeath and devise to Annie R. Morse, all the net and residue of my property real and personal of whatever kind including furniture, notes, mortgages, accounts, money

on hand at my death, and all rest of my estate owned by me individually, or inherited from my wife Rebecca Morse, except the following specific legacies.

First: I bequeath and give to Mary Eliza Summers, my teacher and bedstead.

Second: I bequeath and give to Pauline my grand daughter and the daughter of Augustus Felton one teacher bed.

I appoint my daughter Annie R. Morse, executrix of this my Will and Testament, in case she be of age at my death and if she be not of age at my death, then I appoint my friend Chad R. Thomas Jr. my Executor and Guardian of Annie R. Morse, and to assist her to manage my estate.
