First I give and bequeath unto my well beloved wife Sally Parley all my possessions during her life or Widowhood freely to be possessed by her &c My land she is to live on during her life if she thinks proper on condition she remains a Widow but if she Marries or at her death my land with all my Stock are to be sold and the money to be casually divided amongst my three boys Robert Parley Parley, Saban Parley, and George Parley and to the above said Nathaniel Parley I bequeath to my three Daughters Elizabeth Parley, Polly Parley, and Nancy Parley at their Mothers decease or if she Marries again all my Household goods and furniture to be casually divided amongst them freely to be possessed by them and their heirs forever I do appoint William Nelson and John Burton my Executors I do hereby utterly disallow revoke and annul all and every other former Testaments, Wills, Legacies Bequests, Grants by me in any wise before Named Will or bequeathed Satisfying and confirming this and no other to be my last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I have set my hand & seal the day and year first above Written

One a Brood Mare about Nine years Old Brandied or her High Shoulder and Buttock with this D or some way nigh it, The Other a Black Computer to be six year old Two Cattle One a Bay the Other a Brown, One Sow and seven Pigs two Feether beds and furniture two birdsteds Chairs a Cheek a Dark Dutch Oven two Potts, a Brass Kettle 2 Wash Tubs Four Pails and Piggins, half Bushell Three Pewter Dishes Eight plates some Corn and Wheat Flour Whigs some Now on the ground Loom and Sings and other furniture One Ox Three Hoes Shovel Plough Iron pitch fork a Man and Woman Saddles Grindstone and Flax wheel four Winding Gears and sleds and all my Household Churn Cradle, a Mattress Two Pair Flax Hooks two Bibles and other Books Smoothing Iron two Peep hooks Tanning Press I have and to divide the aforesaid premises unto the said Thomas Palmer Senr. his Executors Administrators Assigns. I James Graves of Caswell County and State of North Carolina being very weak in body but of perfect mind and Memory do make this my Last Will and Testament that I do say in form as follows to wit, My last Will and Desire is that all my estate be Equally Divided after my Decease I Desire that my Sister Ann Yancy shall have my slave for ever after being praised by two Men to the Value in the year twenty and also I Desire that my Brother Thomas Graves shall have my Negro boy and for him to be Valued in the same manner and that they should pay back to the rest what is Ours an Equal Part and I Desire that all the rest should be Valued in the same way and an Equal Division made Among them all Also I do constitute and appoint my Brother Thomas Graves and Bartlett Yancy my whole and sole Executors of this my Last Will and Testament In Witness whereof I hereunto set my hand and Seal this tenth day of April in the year 1786.
