

D. L. Warlick and Sixth part. Mrs. R. L. Sider one sixth part. Mrs. M. M. Headlick one sixth part. The children of Lanny Gault one sixth part. The children of Martha Roberts one sixth part. Willie M. Warlick daughter of W. T. Warlick one sixth part. I absolve that if I have any note or money on hand at my death, after all my debts are paid, the remainder to be divided among my heirs as set forth in this seventh item of my will.

Item Eighth. It is my will and desire that unless my interest in the woolen mill is disposed of during my lifetime, that my executor be and he be hereby authorized to sell said interest either privately or publicly whichever may be to the best interest of all or a majority of the parties concerned, and out of the proceeds thereof pay to my heirs as prescribed in item seventh of my will.

Item Ninth. It is my will and desire that my Grand daughter Willie M. Warlick pay to John + Mary L. Roberts, the sum of fifty dollars each, out of her part of the estate named in item seven + eight of this will provided her interest under said items amounts to one hundred dollars, if not whatever sum it may be not exceeding one hundred dollars.

Lastly I hereby constitute and appoint my son H. A. Abernathy and L. R. Whitener (as they) as executors of this my last will and testament and ask that they execute a bond in court for the faithful performance of their duties as in case of Administrators.
