" I, Frederick Killian of Leetwoka County, do hereby make publish
and declare, this as my last Will and Testament in
words and figures as follows to wit:

Item First, My executor hereinafter named is to pay all
my just debts out of any money or property on hand
at my death.

Item Second, I will and bequeath to my son Samuel
E. Killian, fifty acres of land including the dwelling
and out houses where I formerly lived for which land,
I have conveyed to him by deed of gift valued at
four hundred dollars, which I consider his
fair share in my land.

I have also sold unto my son Samuel E. Killian,
all my other land for which he has paid me
several hundred dollars in cash and given
me a bond for my support for the remainder
of my life, and has received a deed of
conveyance for said land.

Item Third, I give and devise to my three daughters
Lydia Pitt, Derrick wife of James Brown, Nancy
Holler and Mary wife of Luther Thineulent each the
sum of one hundred and seventy five dollars,
which has also been paid to them out the
money paid to me by my son Samuel for the
aforesaid land, which I consider their fair
share in all my land.

Item fourth, After my executor hereinafter named,
shall have paid all my debts, out of the money
and notes on hand at my death, he shall divide
all the remainder equally between my four
daughters and my son Samuel's share and
share alike and in case any of said
children die before me, then the share
of such child is to go to his or her
children if any.

Lasty I hereby appoint my son Samuel
E. Killian the executor of this my last
will and Testament. Frederick Killian
Witnessed by us in the presence of each other,
and in the presence and at the request of the
testator this 18th of Dec 1875.

Signer Jacob "In the name of God, Amen I Jacob J. Lymon
being of a sound mind and disposing memo-
rily, but feeble in health, and viewing the
uncertainty of life, and certainty of death,
do this day constitute and make this
to be my Last Will and Testament in
Manner and following, first, I command,
by life and body to God who gave it, to
be preserved by him.
Second. I will that my Executor hereinafter
named shall furnish me with a suitable
burial in a decent manner and furnish
Yourselves to be paid out of my estate.
Third I will that all my Real Estate be
and remain as it now is, that is
to remain as it now is until my
youngest daughter Alice is twenty one
years old, then to be divided equally
among all my children share & share
alike, that is after my younger children
be advanced equal with those who have
already received advancements. The fol-
lowing are the advancements made
to cut. To Pinckney One hundred & twenty
five dollars. To David my son five
hundred dollars. To Ellen Reinhardt
my daughter three hundred dollars
the balance of my children to receive
the same with those who have been
advanced, before they shall receive any
further legacy so that in the final
settlement all shall share alike.
Fourthly I will that Julius, Mary Jane,
Fanny & Alice shall have the use and
profits of all my lands to their own
use and profits of all my lands
until Alice is twenty one years old,
I also will to Julius the mare Molly
or Lucy, to Mary Jane my mare Lucy,
and Fanny to have her choice of my
mules, and to Alice my two year old
