E. D. Norwell and Mr. John H. Dillard I
opened this envelope about 9 A.M.
Dec. 31, 1920. M.W.Bell."

The same was handed to him, as

aforesaid, by the said L.L. Witherspoon, and has not at any time been out of his keeping and control, nor in the keeping or control of any other person and that he now presents same just as it was entrusted and delivered to him by said L.L. Witherspoon as aforesaid.

The proceeds arising from sale of my property, after above disposition to be equally divided between

my children.

My estate has no claim upon articles of household and kitchen furniture purchased by my wife since our marriage.

I bequeath my watch to my grandson L.L. Witherspoon, Jr., to be delivered to him by his father when he reaches his 18th year.

A will heretofore made is revoked for the reason that I am satisfied the above disposition will be of more benefit to those concerned.

The bequest to my wife is in full of her legal interest in my estate. I nominate and appoint my friend W.M. Bell, Executor. April 3 - 1920 -
