That he is the eldest son of James Taylor, now deceased, who was the beneficiary under bill H.R. 1131, and is the identical James Taylor mentioned in the finding of the Court of Claims No. 1344, referred to the said court by the House Committee on Claims on February 23, 1887, and reported as Congressional case No. 1344. The said James Taylor being the identical person mentioned in House Document No. 187, 44th Congress, First Session, which included finding of the United States Court of Claims filed May 3, 1909.

2. That the affiant is acting for and in the capacity of attorney representing himself, his two brothers names respectfully William J. and James L. Taylor, and two sisters names respectfully Madore Parker and Addie Matthews.
