and if there should be any surplus over and

such surplus shall go to R.D. Allman and his
wife for taking care of me through my sickness

R.D. Allman my lawful Executor to all
intents and purposes to execute this my
last Will and testament according to the
true intent and meaning of same and

every part part and clause thereof hereby revoking
and declaring utterly void all other wills and
testaments by me heretofore made
in witness whereof I the said Mary Voyles do hereunto
set my hand and seal this 15th day of August 1921

public, proclaim, and declare this my last Will
and Testament; as follows:

In consideration of the loyalty, and

my daughters, I direct, and Will that Harriett

own in fee simple all of my Real estate,
