

The last will and Testament of Christopher Robinson dec^d Exhibited and proved at May term 1819

In the name of God... AMEN. I Christopher Robinson of Cape Patteras, Bucks in Lancaster County, being sick in body, but of perfect mind and memory, calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make this my last will and Testament, and first of all I recommend my soul to God who gave it me, and my body to the dust, to be buried in a decent manner, at the discretion of my executors, and as touching such worldly estate as it has pleased Almighty God to bestow upon me, I give and dispose of them in the following manner and fashion. And first of all my just debts to be paid, and then I leave to my daughter Polly a tract of land lying in said Township, bounded line, running north easterly to a large live oak at the south west end of my potato patch, also a bed and furniture with countesspane, also a new linen sheet, and one cow by the name of Milpail, also all her mother's clothes left at her decease, with the chest they are in, and one half of a negro woman by the name of Nith, and one fourth of the child that she is with child of at present. Also to my son Christopher Robinson a tract of land, beginning at said Polly Robinson's line, running north westerly to a large water oak to the north east of the grave yard, with the house and outbuildings, belonging to said land with the bed stand and bed and furniture, that said Christopher Robinson also one half of Nith and one fourth of child she is with child of at present, and one English mill kit, and one third of my sailing boat. Also I leave to my daughter Betsey Robinson a bed stand and bed that she has given her, also one half of the child that Nith is with child to her son George Lef's Tyson. Also I leave to daughter Betsey's son Freeman Wallis Tyson a tract of land, beginning at said third of her Robinson line, running north westerly to a dead water oak, the potato patch excepted to Christopher Robinson. Also I leave to my son Robert Robinson a tract of land, beginning at Freeman W. Tyson's line, running north westerly to a live oak, above of the north end of this potato patch, also a bed he formerly occupied also one half of my negro boy by the name of Ben to said Morris Robinson son William Robinson. Also I leave to said William Robinson, one third of my sailing boat. I leave to my son Andrew Robinson a tract of land, beginning at Morris Robinson's line, running north easterly to Daniel Tolson dec^d line; also one bed and one half of the negro boy by the name of Ben, and one cow by the name of Nith, and one third of my sailing boat. And I do appoint Christopher Robinson my Executor to this my last will, and I do acknowledge this to be my last will, and Testament.

I Stephen Gaylard in my right mind, and memory now make this my last will and Testament, to wit, I give and bequeath to my lawful wife Anna Gaylard all my houses and lands and my negro girl Fanny, and all my stock, and all my property within doors and without doors to her will and disposal forever and ever, to dispose of as she pleases forever. The last will and Testament of Jarvis Allen dec^d Exhibited and proved at August term 1819

State of North Carolina. In the name of God, AMEN. I Jarvis Allen of Brunswick County, the state and county aforesaid, being in my perfect senses, and of sound mind and memory, thanks be to God; calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and obtain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following, to wit. Imperius. I give and bequeath unto my wife Polly Allen a piece of land joining Mr. Holoway's land on the southward and to run from Mr. Holoway's land southwardly along the water so as to contain one third part of my land to the southward of Mr. Holoway's land, and to run from the water westwardly to the head line, then northwardly to Mr. Holoway's line, then to bind this line to the water, containing about ten acres of land, to her and her heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Abigail Allen one third part of my tract of land adjoining Mr. Holoway's land, on the southward; beginning on the sound side at the land I have given to my wife, thence binding the water southwardly so far as to run a westerly course to the head line, and then a northwardly course to the land given to my wife will contain one third part of my tract of land to the southward of Mr. Holoway's land, containing about ten acres of land, to her and her heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath unto my son Jesse Allen the other third part of my tract of land to the southward of Mr. Holoway's land; beginning on the sound side adjoining the land given to my daughter Abigail Allen, thence to run southwardly to James Spry's land, thence westwardly, binding Spry's land to the head line, thence northwardly to the land given to my daughter Abigail, thence binding her land to the water, containing about ten acres of land, to him and his heirs forever. Item. I give unto my daughter Sally Eddison ten acres of land adjoining Mr. Holoway's land to the northward, beginning on the sound side at Mr. Holoway's land, thence northwardly binding the water so far as by running a westerly course parallel with Mr. Holoway's line to the head of Parker's creek, will contain the ten acres of land, to her and her heirs forever.
