

The last will and Testament of Christopher Rollinson dec^d Exhibited
and proved at May term 1819

In the name of God. Amen. I Christopher Rollinson of Cape Hatteras banks in Currituck county, being sick in body, but of perfect mind and memory, calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make this my last will and Testament, and first of all I recommend my soul to God who gave it me, and my body to the dust to be buried in a decent manner, at the discretion of my executors, and as touching such worldly estate as it has pleased Almighty God to give me with, I leave and bequeath of him in the following manner and forms.

I do first of all my just debts to be paid, and then I do leave to my daughter Polly a tract of land containing 1/2 acre of land lying between line running north easterly to a large live oak at the southwest end of my potato patch, also a bed and furniture with a country pane, also a new linen sheet, bought by the name of Philip, also all her mother's clothes left at her decease, with the chest they were in, and one half of a negro woman by the name of Ruth, and one fourth of the child that she is with child of at present. Likewise to my son Christopher Rollinson a tract of land, beginning at said Polly Rollinson's line, running west by a large water back to the northwest of the grave yard, with the house and outbuildings belonging to said land with the bed stand in it and furniture that said Christopher Rollinson, also one half of Ruth and one fourth of child she is with child of at present, and one English mustard, and one third of my sailing boat. Also I leave to my daughter Betsy Rollinson a bed stand and bed that she gave given her, also one half of the child that Ruth is with child to her son George. Also to my daughter Polly a tract of land, beginning at said Christopher Rollinson's line, running north easterly to a dead water oak, the potato patch excepted to Christopher Rollinson. Also I leave to my son Morris Rollinson a tract of land, beginning at Freeman W. Ferguson's line, running north easterly to a live oak about 1/2 the north end of his potato patch, also a bed he now only occupies also one half of my negro boy by the name of Ben to said Morris Rollinson son William Rollinson: Also I leave to said William Rollins, one third of my sailing boat. Also to my son Ruben Rollinson a tract of land, beginning at the first Rollinson line, running north easterly to Daniel Fisher's line: also one bed and one half of the negro boy by the name of Ben, and one cow by the name of white gate, and one third of my sailing boat. And I do appoint Christopher Rollinson my Executor to this my last will, and I do acknowledge this to be my last will, and Testament.

I Stephen Gaylard in my right mind and memory now make this my last will and Testament to it, I have and bequeath to my lawful wife Anna Gaylard all my houses and lands and my negro girl Fanny, and all my stock, and all my property within doors and without doors to her will and disposal forever and ever, to dispose of as she pleases forever. The last will and Testament of Jarvis Allen dec^d Exhibited and proved at August term 1819

In the name of God, AMEN. I Jarvis Allen of Currituck County, in the state and country aforesaid, being in my perfect senses, and of sound mind and memory, do make to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and obtain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following, to wit.

Imprimis. I give and bequeath unto my wife Polly Allen a piece of land joining Mr. Holloway's land on the southward, and to run from Mr. Holloway's land southwardly along the water so as to contain one third part of my land to the southward of Mr. Holloway's land, and to run from the water westwardly to the head line, then northwardly to Mr. Holloway's line, then to bind his line to the water, containing about ten acres of land, to her and her heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Abigail Allen one third part of my tract of land adjoining Mr. Holloway's land, on the southward, beginning on the sound side at the land I have given to my wife, thence binding the water southwardly so far as to run a westerly course to the head line, and then a northerly course to the land given to my wife will contain one third part of my tract of land to the southward of Mr. Holloway's land, containing about ten acres of land, to her and her heirs forever.

Item. I give and bequeath unto my son John Allen the other third part of my tract of land to the southward of Mr. Holloway's land, beginning on the sound side adjoining the land given to my daughter Abigail Allen, thence to run southwardly to James Spry's land, thence westerly binding Spry's land to the head line, thence northerly to the land given to my daughter Abigail, thence binding her land to the water, containing about ten acres of land, to him and his heirs forever. Item. I give unto my daughter Sally Carlton ten acres of land adjoining Mr. Holloway's land to the northward, beginning on the sound side at Mr. Holloway's land, thence northwardly binding the water so far as by running a westerly course parallel with Mr. Holloway's line to the head of Parker's creek, will contain the ten acres of land, to her and her heirs forever.
