

The Last Will and testament of Daniel Lee  
Deceased Exhibited and Proved at Selby Term 1893.

In the name of God amen I Daniel Lee  
of the County of Currituck and state of North Carolina  
being of a sound and perfect mind and memory  
I thank be God for the same do this twenty second  
day of October in the year of our Lord one thousand  
eight hundred and twenty two do make and  
publish this my last will and testament in  
manner and form following that is to say

Ist I give and bequeath unto my son Lepee Lee  
the land and plantation that I now live on and one  
other tract of Land beginning as follows beginning at the  
Meedy Branch down at the junction running up the  
main ditch to Richard Flory's line and thence to  
a corner oak and thence along a cleared way  
where I intend to cut a ditch to Cutlers line and  
thence along the branch to Hollowell Etheridge's line  
then up the side line to the Bunnells Land he  
bought of Wright thence across the road joining  
Thos. Wright's land to the junction thence along  
the junction to the first station including both  
tracts and three negroes a negro man named King  
and negro Launfort and Rachel and the negroes  
he has in his possession to him and his heirs forever  
Item I give and bequeath unto my Daughter Mary Long  
all the tract of Land she now lives on and the following  
negroes one negro man named Tom and one woman Cindy one  
girl Millie and one negro woman she now has in her  
possession to her and her heirs forever

Item I give and bequeath unto my daughter Frankey Bunn  
one tract of Land called Snodgrapes beginning at the  
corner oak at Richard Flory's line thence binding on the  
Land I gave to my son Lepee Lee thence binding on the  
Land of John Flory and thence to Richard Flory's line

Shew up the line to the first Station and also my parts  
of the Cypress swamp and the following negroes one negro  
man Tom one woman Edy and one boy Peter and the  
negroes she has in her possession and one young Mule  
to her and her heirs forever.

Item I lend the use and benefit of the following <sup>Land</sup> property  
to my Grand daughter Eliza McPherson until she arrive to  
the age of eighteen then for the land to return to my heirs  
the land bearing joining Richard Flory, then a joining will belong to  
West and a joining Mitchell Scott hence binding on the Ginney  
road to the road leads to Tull's Creek down the main road  
to the first station it being the residue of my Land not willed away  
and in case she should marry under the age of eighteen or  
after then I give it to her and her heirs forever and also I  
will the following negroes the same way that I before willed  
the Land one negro boy Tom and one negro girl Petey and  
one Harriet and in case she should marry then I gave them  
to her and her heirs forever. I also give and bequeath unto my  
Grand daughter one cow & calf to her and her heirs forever.

The residue of my estate I give to be equal divided between  
my three children before Lee, a Mary Long, Franky Burnell  
to them and their heirs forever.

Also my son Jeppe Lee I leave to have the whole undivided  
of the above legacies willd away to my Grand daughter Eliza  
McPherson until she marries for her use and benefit.

) And I hereby make and ordain my son Jeppe Lee executor of this  
my last will and testament in witness whereof I the said  
Dannell Lee have to this my last will and testament set  
my hand and seal the day and year above written

The Last Will and Testament of Col'l Capps  
Bent Exhibited 1st Oct term 1823

In the name of God Amen, I Col'l Capps of the County  
of Currituck and State of North Carolina do make and  
ordain this my last will and testament being <sup>of sound</sup>  
mind but low in health in the year of our Lord one  
Thousand Eight Hundred and Twenty December the tenth  
as follows

I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Louisa  
Cappes a negro woman named Anna one cow named Bid  
two cows and calfs four Eves, eight head of hogs one featherbed  
and furniture, one chest and one Safe and all belonging to it  
one iron pot one Spinning wheel to all the flax and cotton  
during her natural life or widowhood her first choice  
in all these things.

Item, I give and bequeath unto my beloved son William  
Capps Seventy eight acres of Land in Beaufort County  
more or less binding on Stewart Williams & my grand Col'l Capps  
three negroes named Tom, George and Pleasant and  
one half of my Bed and if he should die without issue  
his lawfully begotten by his body my will is that  
the said property go to my son Col'l Capps —

Item I give and bequeath unto my son Col'l Capps three acres  
named Anna, James & Frank to considerate them half of his Bed  
Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved Daughter Lydia Brashy  
Sixty dollars to be raised out of my Estate

Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved Daughter Nodah  
Waterfields Sixty dollars to be raised out of my Estate  
Lastly of all my will and desire is that after my Rent and  
Lawfull debts is paid that the residue of my property  
to be equally divided among all of my Children and  
Grand Children and Lastly of all I nominate and appoint  
my two sons William Capps & Col'l my whole undivided  
Executor this my last will and testament  
Signed sealed and delivered in presence of Col'l Capps
