Impunis. I give unto my son Jesse Douge the plantation whereon I now live, containing one hundred and six or seventy acres, to him and his heirs forever. Impunis. I give unto my two daughters Elizabeth and Elvira the plantation whereon Ryland Faushey now lives to them and their heirs forever.

I then I give to my dearly beloved wife, one negro woman and like one negro man called Sam, during her widowhood, likewise I give to her one horse called Morgan, three cows and calves one yoke of steers and cart, to and her heirs forever. Likewise I give to her my sorel mare called Morgan to her, and her heirs forever. —

My desire is for all the rest of my estate to be equally divided between my two daughters, after my debt is paid.

I do appoint Samuel Douge, Peter Barnard whole and sole executor of this my will and Testament. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this 19. the day of January, one thousand eight hundred ten.

I then I send to my wife Lurana Green my house and all my land during her natural life or widowhood, at her death or marriage, the said land to belong to my son James Green, and his heirs lawfully begotten of his body, for want of such heirs the said land to return at his death to the rest of my children.

I then I send also the rest of all my personal property, after paying my just debts to my wife Lurana Green during her natural life or widowhood, at her death to be equally

divided amongst the rest of my children: Also I hereby appoint William Dough executor to this my last Will and Testament, this 28 day January 1812.

I Samuel Fittlett of the state of North Carolina, Currituck county, being in an afflicted state of health and weak in body, but of sound mind, memory, thanks be given to Almighty God, calling to mind the mortality of my body, and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, Viz. Principally and first of all I commend my soul unto the hands of Almighty God, that gave it, and my body I commend unto the earth to be buried in decent christian burial at discretion of my executors hereafter to be named, and touching such worldly estate, whereunto it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life, I give, devise and dispose of the same in the following manner, and to wit.

I then I send to my beloved wife, Lovey Fittlett (whose maiden name was Lovey Russell, afterwards the lawful wife of Jesse Eldridge, and married to me after his decease, by which reason I still bear, now Lovey Fittlett my wife) the use of the manor, plantation whereon I now live, with the dwelling house and all other out houses belonging to said plantation during her widowhood. I then I give and bequeath to my son Thomas Fittlett, one hundred and thirty acres of land, to the northward of my land adjoining William Eldridge, to him and his heirs forever. I give and bequeath to my daughter Sally Fittlett, one hundred and thirty acres to the southward of my land, to her and her heirs forever. Also I give to said daughter, one negro, named Luis, to her and heirs forever. I give and bequeath to Sam Jesse Fittlett, one hundred and thirty acres in the middle between my son Thomas and Sally Fittlett's land, to him and his heirs forever. I then, my Will is, that my vessel be sold to pay my debts. I then, All the rest of my property not given away, to be equally divided among my wife as before mentioned, and my three children, Thomas, Sally and Jesse Fittlett. I then I do nominate and appoint my brother, Thomas Fittlett, whole and sole executor of this my last Will and Testament, ratifying and confirming this and no other, to be my last Will and Testament.
