

In the Name of God Amen John H. Hammond, being
In perfect mind and memory and knowing it is appointed for all
Men once to die and as I am Possessed of Some Small Property
Do wish to divide it between my two daughters Sally Hammond &
Margaret Hammond, in Manner and form following—
Viz I Give unto Sally one large Chest I Give unto Peggy
One middle Sizer trunk also one Quilt trunk also two
Looking Glasses, one large drinking Glass, every of the remainder
of my Property I desire wish to have sold for the purpose of discharging
My Just Contracts, and the surplus to be estimated giving Sally
Two thirds thereof and the remainder unto Peggy Hammond,
to them and their heirs forever In witness whereof I have
Recorded at my hand this 26th day of October, 1802.

I have my desire is that Mary Hammond be paid five
Shillings out of my Property as her full dowry, and more
than she deserves, and I further nominate and appoint
My friend John Williams Esq. my true and lawful Executor
To this my last will and Testament, watching all other
Sign Guardian to my two daughters—

III. In the Name of God Amen I Sam^l Lee of the County of Cumberland
Being in a low State of Health, but a sound mind and desiring
My Body be given unto God, calling unto mind the mortality of my
Body and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die, I do
Make and ordain this my last will and Testament, that is
To say principally and first, of all I Give and recommend my Soul
Into the hands of almighty God, that gave it and my Body I
Recommend to that his Edict to be buried in a quiet Christian
Burial at the discretion of my Executors, nothing doubting but at
the general resurrection, that I shall revive the same again
By the mighty power of God, and as touching such worldly estate
Wherewith it hath pleased God, to Bless me in this world I Give
And devise and dispose of the same in the following manner—
Item I Give and bequeath to my son Mitchell Lee the
Plantation, and land whereon he now lives, as it is better and bounded
In the deed to him and his heirs forever.

Item I Give and bequeath to my Daughter Catharine Edging one feather
Bed and furniture, one Pew and Pew one Gun two head of Sheep one
Cart one Saw and Piggs, some Cakes wares, to her and her heirs forever—
I Give to my daughter Catharine Edging, two Cowards one carting one
Horse all, two Iron pots, three Saws and nine Shovels, three plate plates
one Mason and a Pecker dish, to one Coo and all belonging to the
Coo, to one Adboard and all my earthen wares, one Grind Stone and
all my Hoes, and three head of Sheep, and my Spade, and one
Washing place, and all my Cakes wares, and all bell to one headboard
and two Heaters, and some Lunk bottles, and one Lunking wheel
and all my sitting chairs, and two meal Sifters and all my Iron
and tools, to her and her heirs forever.

I Give to my daughter Catharine Edging one large Canoe, and
My Iron pot, animal and one quilt pot, and one Sill pot, and one
Coffe pot, to her forever.

Item I Give and bequeath to my son Philip Lee all the rest
of land except the tract to my son Mitchell Lee, that was before
mentioned, to him and his heirs forever. I leave the care of all
the land that I have given to my son Philip Lee to my daughter
Catharine Edging ten years. I do ordain and appoint my son
Philip Lee and Wm^l Edging Executors, to this my last will and Testament.
