

The Last Will & testament of Dory Dauge
did prove August Term 1831

In the name of God Amen, I Dory Dauge of
the State of North Carolina and County of Currituck
being sick, but in perfect mind & shew my thank
be to God for the same do make and ordain this Instru-
ment of writing to be my last Will & testament
First I recommend my soul to him that gave
it and my body to the earth as to my worldly
affairs I give and bequeath as follows viz
My Will & desire is that Angelica Dauge to be one
father bed & ~~chamber~~ ^{own} chest and Elizabeth Dauge
one father bed and chest - Charlotte Dauge one
father bed and chest - my will & desire is for the
beds to be drawn for, let them be valued
them that draws the beds that is value most
pay over to the others that I give unto them &
their heirs forever one help appearing said
hearts Edmund Capto to him forever, all the
remainder part of my estate, lands & tenements
to be sold on a credit of six months for
a acre of of land at fresh Pond and after paying
all my just debts all the remainder part of my
estate to be equally divided between Angelica
Dauge, Samuel Dauge, Elizabeth Dauge, Charlotte
Dauge to them & their heirs forever - I leave
& appoint my trusty friend Thomas Land
my whole & sole executor of this my last Will
& testament. Witness I have hereunto set
my hand & seal this the 26th day of June 1831

Last Will & testament of John
Rodgers proved November Term 1831
In the name of God Amen, I John Rodgers
being low in health, but of sound mind
and memory and considering it is appointed
all men once to die do make & ordain
this my last Will & testament. First it is my
Will that all my just debts be paid after my decease
by my executor - Secondly I give to my son
Rodgers one half of my boat with things to him &
his heirs forever Thirdly I give to son Durant
Rodgers one cow & calf and one gun to him &
his heirs forever. Fourthly I give to my son
Stephen Rodgers one gun - fifthly I give to my
son James Rodgers one gun Sixthly I give
my three sons Durant, Stephen & James Rodgers
all my land to be equally divided amongst
them to them and their heirs forever after the
death of my wife all my Rodgers - seventhly I
give to my wife Mary Rodgers the use of all

my property of every kind during her
life or widowhood and at her death & marriage
to be equally divided amongst all my children
that is their living Wives my hand and seal
this 24th day of October 1831

The Last Will & Testament of John Chaplain
Deceased proved November 7, 1831
State of North Carolina
Currituck County In the name of God Amen
I John Chaplain of the County & State aforesaid
being of sound disposing mind & memory
(although feeble in body) the anks be taken
for the same - Being to mind the uncertainty
of life and the certainty of death, do make and
ordain this my last Will and Testament in
manner and form as follows. First I give
unto my daughter Polly Toller one feather
bed & furniture, one cow and calf and the use
of the Hall room of the house I live in, provided
she does not sell nor rent it out but occupy
it herself and one binners wheel to her and
her heirs forever - Secondly I give unto my
beloved wife Ann Chaplain my negro
woman called Gracy, two feather beds fur-
niture unto her and her heirs forever
Thirdly - I leave to my beloved wife Ann
Chaplain my old negro man James and woman
Pheaby all my kitchen furniture, I also leave to
my wife the married plantation and all the
woodland belonging thereto and the Windmill
with a privilege to sell the mill if she may think
proper to pay my just debts - I also leave to her
all my cattle except the cow & calf I gave to my
daughter Polly, all my gang of hogs, all my sheep
and my mare and horse, coal. I also leave her
all my farming tools - I also leave unto her
all my bacon and Pork all my corn and all my
things in doors and out doors that is not lent
or given away - I also leave her my lighters and
canves and all my nets, with a privilege to
sell such things as she may think proper
to pay my just debts - Lastly after the death
of my wife Ann Chaplain I give and
