

The last will and Testament of Henry Culppeper deceased Exhibited and proved at November term 1815

In the name of God Amen. I Henry Culppeper of the county of Currituck and state of North Carolina, being weak of body, but of sound mind and memory, do make and ordain this my last Will and Testament, in manner and form following, that is to say. First I lend unto my beloved wife Eady Culppeper, part of my plantations whereon I now live, beginning at a gum stump at Samuel Powers' line, formerly called Jesse Joes' and Henry Culppeper's corner tree, thence running westerwardly to a ditch called the great ditch, thence running various courses down said ditch to another ditch which empties in the aforesaid large ditch, thence down said small ditch or southwardly course to Samuell Powers line, thence down said Powers' line to the first station, with all privileges and appurtenances therunto belonging, free from any interruption from any person or persons whatsoever, claiming any right or title therunto, during her natural life. I also lend unto my beloved wife Eady Culppeper, the first choice of all my beds and furniture, and one hard mill and another wheel, and linn what the first choice, and one half my kitchen furniture and one third of all my hogs and cattle that runs at large. Also one mare and plow to be hers the said Eady Culppeper, during her natural life.

Item. I give to my beloved son Hardy Culppeper the remainder part of my land now in my possession which I bought of Lewis Cox, by his the said Henry Culppeper's paying thirty dollars to my estate when in full possession thereof; and after the death of my beloved wife it is my will that my son Hardy Culppeper have full possession of all my lands which I bought of Lewis Cox, containing forty five acres to be the same more or less, to him the said Hardy Culppeper and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved son James Culppeper seven acres of land, by his the said James Culppeper paying to my estate thirty dollars when in full possession thereof; beginning at the aforesaid gum stump in Samuel Powers' line, thence running a westerwardly course down the line which formerly divided Jesse Joes' from me, to a chinquapin post, thence an easterwardly course to Cornelius Powers' line, thence down said Powers' line to Samuel Powers' line, thence down said Samuel Powers' line to the first station, to be his the said James Culppeper and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved son Warren Culppeper fifteen acres of land, beginning at the aforesaid chinquapin post, thence running an easterly course to Cornelius Powers' line, thence running a westerly course down Arthur Culppeper's line to James Humphries' line, thence down said Humphries' line to a line which formerly divided Jesse Joes and me, thence down said line to the first mentioned chinquapin post to be his the said Warren Culppeper and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved son Arthur Culppeper thirty dollars, to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved grandson James W. Humphries after the death of my beloved, the bed which I lent her, during her natural life to be his the said James W. Humphries and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved daughter Julia Culppeper one feather bed and furniture, to be hers the said Julia Culppeper and her heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved grand son Quincy Carrut one feather bed and furniture to him and his heirs forever.

Item. I give to my beloved grandson Wiley Culppeper one feather bed and furniture, to him and his heirs forever.

After my just debts are paid, it is my will that the remainder of my estate which is not lent or given, be equally divided between my five

children. viz. Arthur Culppeper, Francis Holt, James Culppeper, Alice Gerritt and Julia Culppeper; and after the death of my beloved wife Eady Culppeper, should there be any thing remaining which I have lent her, it is my will that it be equally divided between my first above named children. Finally I constitute and appoint my beloved sons James Culppeper and Warren Culppeper to be the sole executors of this my last Will and Testament. In witness whereof I do hereunto set my hands and seal this the 23rd day of November one thousand eight hundred and fifteen.

The last will and Testament of Loney Ballentine deceased Exhibited and proved at November term 1815

In the name of God. I Loney Ballentine of the county of Currituck and state of North Carolina, being weak in body, but of sound mind and memory, thanks be to God for the same, do this 25th day of September in the year of our Lords one thousand eight hundred and fifteen, make and ordain this Instrument of writing to be my last Will and Testament in manner and form as followeth. viz. 1st Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Amanda R. Ballentine two hundred dollars to be converted to the use of buying the said Amanda a negro boy. My will and desire that Samuel Wilson should collect the aforesaid money and execute the said bargain as soon as opportunity will permit at his own judgment.

2^d Item. My will and desire is that the balance of my money which is seventy two dollars after paying my tax, should be divided between my two sons, David and Joseph Ballentine, to be laid out in cleathing and schooling.

3^d Item. My Will and desire is that a small web of cotton yarn should be woven and converted to the use of cloathing my daughter Amanda R. Ballentine.

4th Item my will and desire is that the two webs of woolar should be woven and converted to the use of cloathing my two sons Joseph and David Ballentine. Given under my hand and seal the day and date first written.
