ever. I then I give and bequeath to Charlotte Gregg
two sitting Chairs to her heirs for ever. I then I give
to Charlotte Gregg one Saddle to her and her heirs
forever. I then I give to Charlotte Gregg six Silver
Plates and one dish to her and her heirs forever
and I appoint Charlotte Gregg my sole and sole Executor
of this my last will and Testament by me hereafter
made as witness here to I have set my hand and seal
February the 15th day 1821.

of the State of North Carolina and County of Currituck being
of sound Mind and Memory make and constitute this to
be my last will and Testament first of all I commend
my immortal soul unto the hands of the immortal God
His grace and my body to be buried to the discretion of
my friends and as for my worldly goods where with
it hath been blessed God to bless me with in give and
leave in the following manner

I then I bequeath unto my beloved wife Peggy Woodhouse the of
my land that is Chard with the privilege of fire wood
I will think of my good land. Also I bequeath unto my wife
Peggy Woodhouse negro woman Nabl and man Isaac
and Rebecca

Also one negro boy Arthur & Cabb all of which prop-
erty I lend to her during her widowhood and after my
wife Peggy Woodhouse marriage or death I give the land
in the following manner. I then I give to my son Jonathan
Woodhouse all my land that lyeth to the Eastward of the
Brickhole and a crop fence to him and his heirs forever
I then I give and bequeath unto my son Thomas Woodhouse the
remainder of the plantation which I now live on beginning
at the Brickhole crop the fence to the line between me and
Thomas Whitall and along the said line westerly to the
Branch thence along the Branch in Easterly Course to the
Brickhole crop the fence to him and his heirs forever.
I then I give unto my son Wilson Woodhouse all of that
part of the land that was given to me by my father in
his last will that lieth to the westward of the Branch
bounded as follows south by Eichel Hollings deceased
land and north by Samuel Woodhouse land to him
and his heirs forever.
I then I give and bequeath to my son Hardy Woodhouse
all of the land and appertinances that was given to
me by his Grand father Thomas White Deer. as well
appear by a deed for said land to him and his
heirs forever. and will and desire is that if either
of my four sons Jonathan Woodhouse Thomas Wood-
house Wilson Woodhouse and Hardy Woodhouse
should die without her lawfully begotten on their
body his land shall be Equally divided between the
surviving or living ~~sons~~ sons and so on to the last
I then my wife is that after the Marriage or death of
my wife Peggy Woodhouse I give the Negroes lent her
in the following manner. Negro Arthur I lend to
my daughter Peggy Woodhouse and one half of
Rebecca during her life and if she die without
her lawfully begotten on her body. the aforesaid neg-
ros shall be equally divided between her five small
Brothers and Sisters.

I give I lend to my daughter Rebecca the other half of
Rebecca and negro Boy Cabb during her life and if she
die without lawful heirs begotten on her body the
aforesaid negro to be divided Equally between her five
small Brothers & Sisters

I then I lend to my sons Jonathan Wilson, Hardy
and Thom as Woodhouse negro woman Nabl and
her increase and negro man Isaac to be equally
divided between the aforesaid boys and if either
