In the name of God amen. I Sally Williams of of state of North Carolina being of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be God do this eleventh day of May 1825 in the year of our Lord bearing the forty ninth of American Independence make and publish this my last will and testament in manner following, inanner that is to

First I give and bequeath to Jon Bonathan one negro Boy named Luis and one negro named Turner and one mare and colt and one feather Bed and all my hogs, half of my Cattle to my Jon Bonathan and the things above mentioned thereafter I give to my daughter Linda the other half of my cattle and one feather Bed and one white sheep I give to my Jon William one dollar - then I give to my Jon Vidson one dollar then further I give to son Bonathan all the the remains of my estate out doors and in doors out doors to have and to hold forever and I hereby make and ordain my worthy Jon Bonathan Bonny executor to this my last will and testament.

In witness whereof I the said Sally Williams have to this my last will and testament set my hand and sealed published and declared (here follows a word that is unintelligible) to the said Sally Williams testator as she has with our testament in the presence of us who were present at the time of signing and sealing thereof

The Last Will and Testament of Lydia Jones exhibited and proved at May Term 1826.

In the name of God amen. I Lydia Jones of the County of Currituck and state of North Carolina being sick though of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be God do this day the twenty first of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty five make and publish this my last Will and testament in manner following that is to say. I do give and bequeath to my son John B. Jones the following negroes viz. Gout, Tamer and her three children viz. Cornelia, Moses and her sucking child army and also her increase and negro man Daniel to him and his heirs forever.

I lend to my grand daughter Lydia Brown one bed and furniture, curtains excepted, one flower pot, one set of tin food China, one red cow and yearling, one fow and pigs, to her during her natural life and after her death to her lawful heirs forever, also one note on Edward Hardy for twenty four dollars, I give and bequeath to my son John B. Jones the balance of my estate after paying my funeral expenses to him and his heirs forever - Lastly I do constitute nominate and appoint my son John B. Jones my executor to this my last will and testament, in witness whereof I have hereunto affixed my hand and seal the day and date above. the words right hand and seal was intended to be affixed witnessed by
