Thendge being weak in body but sound in mind and knowing the uncertainty of life, therefore hereby express my wish as respects the property I may leave if I should die being in possession of what I now own - I give to my son Samuel one black man named Joshua - I give to my son George Washington one negro boy named Aaron - I give to my son Eldred one negro man named Captain - I give to my daughter Emily a black woman Chloe and her child - I wish my daughter Emily to have the best bed that was given to me in my dowry with its furniture - The best bed & furniture next best I give to my son Samuel - The next best bed & furniture I give to my son George Washington - The next best to my son Eldred - The Bureau I give to Emily - The looking glass is already Samuel's I give him the clock and the walnut table - The buff and case also to Samuel - The desk to my son Eldred and also a large trunk - The desk Bureau to George Washington - I give the mahogany table to Emily and half a dozen stool chairs (yellow ones) also to Emily a blue chest - a small hair covered trunk to George - a small paper covered trunk to Eldred - The remnant of the chairs I divide between Eldred & Emily - It is further my desire that what my other property may sell for more than will pay my debts be equally divided among all my children - It is my desire that Mr John Brocket and Mr Joseph Dozier should act as my executors - I wish whereof I do here sign my name in presence of

The Last Will and Testament of Olive Fayner
 Deceased was Exhibited at February Term 1828
 In the name of God, amen O Olive Fayner
 of the County of Cambridge and State of North
 Carolina being very sick but in perfect mind
 and memory thank be given to the Almighty God
 calling to mind the mortality of my body knowing
 that it must appointed for a time to die
 calling to mind the mistakes of my Days I have in-
 vented to the hand of the God that gave it to me
 and my body to be buried at the Discretion of my
 Executors last of all I give and bequeath my
 Property as follow
 My Daughter Betsy Fayner one bed the first choice
 to my Daughter Angella one bed 2^d choice
 to my Daughter Votey one bed 3^d choice
 to my 3 daughters above mentioned three linen
 and for each of them
 1/2 Carolina Balance wife of William Balance
 to Haney Walker wife of William Walker the balance
 one bed. Now I have unto my son Enock
 Fayner my horse and a gun Flaw and Hawk
 My Land I give to my son Sam to be Equally
 divided to Joseph Fayner to Nathan Fayner to
 Enock Fayner to Clevy Fayner to Demsey Fayner
 to Pleague Fayner the Land above mentioned to be
 equally divided. I give all my remaining property
 within four months to be equally divided
 among my children calling this my Last Will
 and Testament Disannulling all other Testaments
