One to die do Make and Ordain this my Last will and Testament that is to say  
The first of all Give and command my Soul into the hands of the Almighty God,  
But give it and body Recommand to the earth to be buried in a Christian Manner,  
At the discretion of my Executors. — — —  
First I give to Son Merchant Ballentine One Mare and foal and one bunch  
of feathers Two Ovis the One Name Cherry the Calf and one bunches hair —  
I give to my son Joseph Ballentine One horse colt, One Cow and Calf, one yoke  
of Hens One hen —  
I give the remainder of the cattle to my daughter Sarah Walker and all the  
Sheep and the best hens and my part of the Negroes that fell to me by the death  
of my daughter Julia, the remainder of my Property within doors and without —  
After paying my lawful debts, the remainder to be equally divided among my  
three Children My will and desire is that one Negro Man should have his  
liberty I appoint and ordain Peter Ballentine Executor to this my last will  
and Testament, Ratifying and Confirming this and no other to be my last will  
and Testament In witness whereof I have caused to set my hand and seal  
this sixteenth day of December in the year of our Lord One thousand eight  
hundred and one —

In the Name of God Amen. Griffith Daige of the County of Currituck and State of North Carolina,  
Being sick and weak in body but of sound Mind and Memory Calling to Mind the Mortality  
of man and knowing it is appointed for All men to die do make this my last will and Testament  
In witness whereof I have caused to be done this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of March anno Domini 1802.  
In witness whereof I have caused to be done this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of March anno Domini 1802.  
I give to my beloved wife Franklin Daige the land wherein I live to say that  
Particular the hours are, beginning at a pasture marker on a ditch and along the ditch  
that divide the Old ground Part from the New ground Acroft Mr. Gregory line and down  
his line including all the swamp to Mr. Gregory line and along his line to the first ditch  
Dividing our Wisconsin. Also one acre more. Three Cows and Calves and twelve hogs  
Dry hogs, two Sow, her Choice, Aart of Six with pig. all my Sheep, three work Sheep, 1  
On Cart, three feather bed Furniture. One desk her Choice, One trunk her Choice. One large  
Chair, One Book Table, One square Juniper Table, eight Chairs her Choice, and as many of  
the farming Utensils as may be thought sufficient for the farm, all the Corn and Peas,  
One third of the wheat now growing, two sticks of beef, and as much of my kitchen furniture as  
may be necessary for her to make out with. One Box Chair. my desire is that all the above legacy  
Shall at the death or Marriage of my wife be equally divided Amongst all my Children  
And it is my desire that all the remainder of all my lands and all the remainder of my estate  
Not already given away be sold by my executors hereafter known for the purpose of  
Paying my debts, and after paying my debts, the remainder to be applied to give my  
small children education, then the remainder to be equally divided amongst all my  
children, forty I nominate & appoint my beloved wife Franklin Daige, Edmund  
Samuel Webster & Thomas S. Webster, my executors to this my last will and Testament.  
Ratifying and confirming this to be my last will be. In testimony whereof I have caused  
set my hand and seal, this 3<sup>rd</sup> day of March anno Domini 1802.
