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The Last Will and Testament of Richard Dough
deceased Exhibited and proved at February Term 1825

State of North Carolina In the name of God amen
Currituck County B Richard Dough of the
State and County aforesaid being in my perfect senses and strength
of memory, do make and ordain this instrument of writing
to be and contain my last Will and Testament in manner and
following - First I recommend that all my just debts be punctu-
ally paid by my execut or hereafter to be named and as touching
such worldly Estate as it has pleased God to bless me with I
dispose of in following manner and form as follows

I give unto my grand son Frederick Dough son of Richard
Dough deceased ^{and} ~~whereof his father Frederick Dough deceased~~
Dough deceased formerly lived to him and his heirs forever

I consider that the abatement I made my son William Dough in
the price of the tract of Land I sold him some years ago to be his
equal Legacy or portion of my estate

I then I give unto my son William Dough two dollars in notes to
him and his heirs forever

I then I give unto Lydia Dough daughter of Sampson Dough
ten dollars in notes to her and her heirs

I then I give unto my son John C. Dough one negro boy George
that I gave him by a deed of Gift some time past to him and his heirs
the above named negro boy George being the same that my son
John C. Dough sold to Miles Gallop Esqr

I then I give unto my son John C. Dough sixty two dollars and forty
and one fourth cent which sum the said John C. Dough due me
by book account to him and his heirs

I consider that the negro Girl named Lydia that I gave my son
Caleb Dough a deed of Gift for also one horse and one feather bed
and one ~~cow~~ sow to be his equal legacy or part of my estate
all of said articles he has had heretofore

I then I give unto my son Caleb Dough two dollars in notes to him and his heirs

I then I give unto my Grand son John Lindsey two dollars in notes to him and his heirs

I then I give unto my Grand son Benjamin McKimney two dollars
in notes to him and his heirs -

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I then I give unto my daughter Eliza both & thirdly one negro woman
named Lydia and the Indian one feather bed and furniture one cow and
calf one spinning wheel all of which articles she has had already
in her possession and as an additional legacy I give unto my
daughter Elizabeth & thirdly one dollar in notes to her and her heirs
I consider that this negro Girl named Lydia that I gave a bill of sale for
one feather bed and furniture - one Spinner wheel to be my daughter
Susanna Marshall legacy all of which articles she has or has had
in her possession and as an additional legacy I give unto my
daughter Susanna Marshall two dollars in notes to her and her
heirs - I then I give unto my two grand daughters Polly and Ruth
Green two dollars each in notes to them and their heirs -
I then I give unto my grand son Jasper Green two dollars in notes to him and
his heirs.

I then I give unto my son Augustus Cabarrow Dough about one hundred
acres of Land bounded as follows on the Southward by the Land
I have already given to my grand son Frederick Dough on the
westward part on the Land formerly belonging to Land Thomas and
the Land formerly belonging to Thomas Brown deceased on the
Northward part by the ditch that runs across my plantation
and to run Eastwardly from said ditch through the woods the
same course of the ditch to Elizabeth Gregory's Land and thence
southerly with Elizabeth Gregory's Land to I spread Chaplains
Land thence southerly to a line to be made between said tract
of Land and the land given to my Grandson Frederick Dough to him
and his heirs forever

I then I give unto my son Augustus C. Dough one negro Girl named
Polly also a negro boy named Lant also one feather bed and
furniture to him and his heirs

I then I give unto my son Augustus C. Dough ^{about} one half of my
marsh on all male sound supprime to be ^{about} twelve and one half
acres to him and his heirs forever

I then I give unto my son William Shephard Dough my late and plant
now whereon now live as far southwardly as Augustus C. Dough
Land also the other half of my marsh lying on Albemarle Sound
supprime to be about twelve and one half acres to him and his
heirs forever

I then I give unto my son William D. Dough one negro man named
David also one boy named Tom also one feather bed and furniture
also one beefst to him and his heirs -

I then I give unto my daughter Mary Dough one negro man named
Daniel also one negro boy named Lewis also one negro boy named
Sampson also one feather bed and furniture to her and her
heirs forever

My will and desire is that if either of the negroes given in the will to Augustus b. Bough, William b. Bough and Mary Bough should die before Mary Bough comes of age then and in that case the sum of that three negro dies before Mary Bough comes of age, to have a negro boy by the name of Obed, but in case neither of these negroes dies before Mary Bough comes of age then the said negroes ^{named} to be equally divided between Augustus b. Bough, William b. Bough and Mary Bough. or these three said negroes Obed if any reference to be paid out of my estate by my executors then after named and if said negro should be any profit before my daughter comes of age in the negro is divided among my three children then the profit also to be divided equal, but if the negro should go to either of them by one of these negroes dying then the profit also to go with of said negro

I then give unto my two sons Augustus b. Bough, William b. Bough and my daughter Mary Bough one old negro woman named Abiah and one negro woman named Calo also two feather beds and furniture one horse named prattled and one yellow table six Windsor sitting chairs and one rocking chair and harness to them and their heirs

My will and desire is that after my decease my executors hereafter named sell all the remainder of my estate not given away in this will for six months credit and after my debts are paid, all the remainder part of my estate of what kind or nature is ever I give unto my two sons Augustus b. Bough, William b. Bough and my daughter Mary Bough to be equally divided among them & their heirs.

Lastly I appoint Thomas Poyner your my whole & sole executor to this my last will and testament and in case he should depart this life before me or not qualify as executor, then in either case above mentioned I appoint Calist Forbe Esqr to act as my executor — in witness whereof I the said Richard Bough hath hereunto set my hand and seal this

The Last Will and Testament of S. S. D. Powers deceased Exhibited and proved at May Term 1805

In the name of God Amen or be remembered that I John D. Powers of the State of Carolina. Currituck County being weak in body but of sound mind and memory blessed be God for the year now make this day this my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say First I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Susannah Powers all the provisions belonging to me at my death consisting of corn pork beef peatons and poultry of all sorts one my dringill and first also all my stock of sheep also on horse by the name of Robt and on mare by the name of Blase also on head first shays also all my horses also all my children furniture consisting of pots plates dishes spoons tubs Piggins and all meassurs also my chest also all my house I also give one part of my land next at the main road, beginning at a chinkefow point along the fence next to the back swamp running to the end of a ditch thence down said ditch straight to the land that I bought of Jonathan McCoy, also one half of my stock of cattle the first shays also one hand mill and thimble cheaw and harness also I give and bequeath unto my son Moses B. Powers one part of my land beginning at a black ground in the edge of the Syphers swamp running straight to the end of a ditch that is now in my spring thence down that ditch straight to the land that I bought of Jonathan McCoy thence down that street to the main road also one feather bed that he has now in possession also one horse and cart by the name of Rock

I also give unto my son S. S. David Powers one piece of Land beginning at a black ground in the edge of the Syphers swamp thence running straight to a matured apple tree thence down the apple tree now to the main Road thence down to William Matthias line or as to give S. S. David Powers one hundred and three acres also one cow and one meat by the name of gin and two cows and calves also I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Bough a mare woman three dollars in cash to be paid out of my whole I also give and bequeath unto my grandson George Washington Powers one piece of Land beginning at a chinkefow point near my Gate in the edge of the diabol thence to William

Matthias back line thence down said ditch thence to William Matthias thence along his line to David Spruells corner maple thence along said Spruells line to Edward Darro corner maple thence along said Darro line to the main road thence along the main Road to the first station point above cow by the name of comfort also I give and bequeath unto my grand son John A. C. Powers the other part of Land where I now live one also on heffer by the name of pleaser also I bequeath unto my grandson Newton B. Powers the
