I bequeath unto my son John Etheridge the land and plantation where I now live for the same to take possession after when becomes Twenty one years of age I wish the plantation to be rented out & and the profits to go to my four daughters I had by my wife Margaret Etheridge all I want my wife Elizabeth Etheridge to have the fifth part of the rent of the land also I bequeath unto my wife Elizabeth Etheridge the fifth part of my moveable property also I bequeath unto my four daughters that I had by my late wife Margaret Etheridge also I bequeath unto my son Elias Etheridge one piece of land I bought of John E. Hutton also I wish my son John Etheridge to have wood and rail timber & light wood off S^r Elias land if needed also bequeath unto the children that I have by my wife Elizabeth Etheridge one Negro man & one Negro woman member to them & their heirs for ever.

This being my last Will and Testament I ordain my duly beloved wife Elizabeth Etheridge my Exec^r to my last will and this the 11th of April 1825 given under my hand and seal

This last will and testament of Robert Etheridge was exhibited and proved in open Court by the oaths of Moses Punnett subscribing witness thereto I ordered recorded. Elizabeth Etheridge came into open Court and relinquished her right to qualify as executor thereto and at the same time signed her descent from the will of her said husband Robert Etheridge for motion it was made that the same be entered of record. Letters of administration with the will annexed of Robert Etheridge were granted to Samuel Poole son of Tennessee who qualified & bound him in form of law.

In the name of God Amen I Thomas Whitehall of the State and county afores^d make and constitute this to be my last will and Testament first of all I recommend my Immortal soul unto the hands of God that gave it and my body to be buried in decent manner at the Discretion of my friends and my worthy goods I bind and give in the following manner I bind to my beloved wife wife Sally this Plantation where on I now live & one negro man named Brister and one negro boy named Tom and feather bed & furniture of the first choice & one hundred dollars in silver and all the crop as it stands and all the Hogs & one horse and all the rest of the House in furniture Except what beds I shall hereafter mention three Cows and calves of the first choice and all the farming tools & as many barrels as she wants the above articles I bind to her my wife during her natural life or widowhood and she must keep my son Robert Whitehall free from any charges and my son Thomas Whitehall she must keep two years free from any charge I am I give to Thomas Jarvis one negroe girl named Silve and his heirs for ever I am I give all the property that I have bind unto my wife to be equally divided between my two sons Robert Whitehall & and Thomas Whitehall.

I am I give unto my son James Whitehall & Thomas Whitehall the Lands that I bought of Thomas Simmons to be equally divided between them and to be divided by Daniel Lindsey D. Hoff Alexander Whitehall & Thomas Jarvis Jr and I give unto James Whitehall one negro boy named Jacob & one feather bed & furniture I am I give three hundred dollars in cash unto Thomas Whitehall & Robert Whitehall & all my Grand children now young to be equally divided between them when Thomas Whitehall shall come of age and the above money to be put out on interest and the interest to go to the schooling of my two sons Robert Whitehall & Thomas Whitehall I have I bind unto Thomas Payner and his wife Polly one Negro boy named Dempsey and after their death to be equally divided between Sarah Payner
