Casey, untill my daughter Lovey Sawyer Casey, is sixteen years old, my children being raised and schooled, my will is, that all the profits arising from my property and house in Norfolk, with my perishable property, shall be equally divided among all my children, except my two sons, to whom I have given my land. My will is that my sons shall all be put, to Trade; such as are secular, thinks proper in some Town. My will is, that my land shall only be tilled in Indian corn at a time, and that they shall sowed in any kind of small grain. I leave my son Thomas C. Casey my executor, to this my last will and Testament, with full power, to act according to my will; also to sell any property at private sale, that he thinks proper. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand, and seal, this the sixth day of May in the year of our Lord, one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, being the thirty eighth year of American Independence, signed and sealed in the presence of us,

Samuel Whitehurst son, of the county of Currituck in the state of North Carolina, being sick in body but of sound and disposing mind, and memory, blessed be god for ever, do this thirtieth day of Sept., in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and fourteen, make, publish and declare this my last will and Testament, in the following manner, Viz
First. I give and bequeath to my son Gideon Whitehurst, and my son Samuel Whitehurst my plantation and tract of land lying on Indian Ridge, whereon my father formerly lived to be equally divided between them, to them and their heirs forever.
Item. I give and bequeath to my son Gideon Whitehurst, one negro man named Jack, and one red heifer, and one white heifer to him and his heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath to my son Samuel Whitehurst, one negro boy named Muck, and one cow & calf and one yoke of oxen and one gang of hogs fed on Joppe Jocas' land. Item. I give and bequeath to my son Enoch Whitehurst, and my son Peter Whitehurst, the land and plantation whereon I now live, to be equally divided between them, to them and their heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath to my son Enoch Whitehurst, one negro boy named Job and one gang of hogs, fed over the run & one cow & calf and my stud horse and one yoke of oxen. Item. I give and bequeath to my son Peter Whitehurst, one young mare of the Jabore breed, and one cow and calf, and one chest that belonged to his mother.
Item. I give and bequeath to my son James Whitehurst, all the land and plantation that I bought of Gabeel Parr lying in west swamps, and one negro named Landon and the one eyed mare, and half the gang of Guinea hogs, and one dish that belonged to his mother.
Item. I give and bequeath to my daughter Sally Whitehurst one negro girl named Sarah, and one young mare, and one cow, and calf, and one feather bed and furniture, to her, and her heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath to my grand son James Whitehurst, one cow and calf, to him and his heirs forever.
Item. I give and bequeath to my grand son John Sears, one cow, and calf, to him and his heirs forever.
Item. I give and bequeath to my grand daughter Polly Sears, one cow and calf, to her, and her heirs forever.
Item. I give and bequeath to my son Enoch Whitehurst, and son Peter Whitehurst, my wood land joining Solz, Jarvis' heirs, to be equally divided between them, to them and their heirs forever.
Item. I give to my wife Franky Whitehurst, one negro boy named Will, during her widowhood. Item. I give to my wife Franky Whitehurst one white heifer, with a black neck, and one feather bed and furniture, to her, and her heirs forever.
Item. I give and bequeath to my wife Franky Whitehurst and my daughter Sally Whitehurst, my riding chair and my chair horse buck, to them and their heirs forever.
My will is that the remaining part of my property, that is not already given away, after paying my debts, shall be equally

divided between my sons Enoch Whitehurst and Samuel Whitehurst and Francis Whitehurst and Peter Whitehurst & my daughter Sally Whitehurst, to them & their heirs forever. I nominate and appoint my son Enoch Whitehurst my executor to this my last will and testament. A Noncaptive will of Samuel Whitehurst, dec'd, made in his last sickness, in his own house, as follows. November the 24th 1814.

Item. It is my will that my wife Frances Whitehurst, shall have half my gang of shined hogs, to her and her heirs forever.

Item. It is my will that my son Gideon Whitehurst, and my son Samuel Whitehurst shall have my hand mill, that is an Indian ridge at Gideon Whitehursts, to them and their heirs forever.

Item. It is my will that my son Enoch Whitehurst and my son Peter Whitehurst shall have my hand mill, that is a frame an east ridge, to them and their heirs forever.

I Benjamin Russell of the county of Currituck and State of North Carolina being weak in body, but of a sound disposing mind and memory, calling to mind, that it is appointed to all men to die, do make and ordain this to be my last will and Testament in manner, and form as follows. First recommending my soul to almighty God that gave it to me

Item. I lend unto my wife the house and plantation whereon I live, during her natural life or widowhood, and one negro woman named Sallitha, and one boy, Sam, are girl Grace during her natural life or widowhood, on his keeping her, two children, Susannah, and Daniel Russell, of age of my expense to keep.

Item. I give to my wife one negro man called, two feather beds and furniture and all the iron ware and chairs and chests and table, to her, and her heirs. Also lend unto my wife after selling enough to pay my just debts all of my indebted property during her widowhood. Item. I give unto my son Daniel Russell the plantation whereon I now live and one boy by the name of George, to him and his heirs.

Item. I give unto my daughter Susannah, after the death or marriage of my wife, one negro woman by the name of Sallitha, one boy by the name of Sam, one girl by the name of Grace, and all the rest of my estate within doors and without, to my daughter Susannah, except the crop and hogs to go to my wife and heirs. I do nominate my brother Daniel Summers, to be my whole and sole executor to this my last will and testament, and do empower him to act as he may think best for my children. In witness whereof I do hereunto set my hand and seal this the 27th of November, 1814.

My will is that my two last sons John Jarvis and William Jarvis shall have all my land, if they live to the twenty one years of age, and if either of them dies before he is twenty one years
