I Willis Guin being in a low state of health but of a sound disposing mind am moving thanks be to God for the same, as it is appointed for all Men Once to die I Make and Ordain this to be my last will and Testament. Enjoining All others by me made, first I recommend my soul to almighty God who spare it over and My body to be buried at the discretion of my Executors hereafter mentioned.

Item I Give to My beloved wife Jonima Guin the land and Plantation whereon I now live with all the Emersion of my Property within and without doors, during her My widow hood, or Natural life my wish and desire that my two daughters and my son Daniel Guin live with my beloved wife, and that she sell or dispose of such of my Perishable Property as they shall think proper to raise and school my three mentioned Children, and when she shall think proper to assist my other two sons Willis and Thomas Guin with Money to school them, I shall be Glad but Nothing More. My will is after the Marriage or death of my wife, that my land be sold by my Executor, and the money arising from that sale to be equally divided between my three sons namely Willis Thomas and Daniel Guin to them and their heirs forever.

All the remainder of my Estate I Give to my two daughters namely Susanna and Mary Guin, to them and their heirs, after the Marriage or death of my wife Jonima Guin I constitute and appoint my beloved wife and my brother John Guin, my whole and sole Executors of this my last will by me made. Given under my hand this second day of May One thousand eight hundred and two. Attest my wife to Give to my son Daniel Guin One bed and furniture when she shall see he stands in need of it.

I Thomas Surber being of a sound and perfect mind and memory thanks be to almighty God for the same and Calling to mind that it is appointed for man Once to die, do Give and dispose of my worldly estate in manner and form following that is to say I Give I Sell and do my wife Elizabeth Surber the use and benefit of my land and Plantation during her widowhood but in case she should Intermarry or die before the said land and Plantation, to Betsey Burington, but if she should die without being in such case I Give the said Plantation to James Surber of the Parish of Beagons Surber executor to him and his heirs forever.

My will and desire is that all the rest of my estate both within door and without door be sold and after Just debts are paid I Give the remainder to my wife Elizabeth Surber forever.

I do Nominate and appoint my wife Elizabeth Surber my whole and sole Executor to this my last will and Testament in testimony hereof I have hereunto set my hand seal this twenty sixth day of August 1799. Testimony before a Justice of the Peace in and for the County of Worcester.
