The last will and Testament of Willoughby  
Doxie deceased Exhibited and proved Aug. term 1818

In the name of God, amen. I Willoughby Doxie being of sound mind and memory, but very sick in body, calling unto mind, knowing it is appointed for all men <sup>to die</sup>. I have given and bequeath unto William Humphries, John Humphries and Chloë Humphries a tract of land called Harris' place, ninety six acres more or less. I have given unto William Humphries a negro boy named Sampson. I have given unto John Humphries a negro boy by the name of Isaac. I have given unto Chloë Humphries a negro man called Ceasar. I have given all the residue of my estate land and personal property to equally divided amongst my brothers and sisters, except brother Knock Doxie, after paying my just debts. I constitute Joseph Doxie and Dennis Doxie my whole and sole executors to this my last will and Testament. In testimony whereof I have written with my hand and seal this 26th day of August, A.D. 1818.

The last will and Testament of Nathaniel Quiddley  
deceased Exhibited and proved at Aug. term 1818.

In the name of God, Amen. I Nathaniel Quiddley of the county of Currituck and State of North Carolina, being at present in reasonable health and sound of mind and memory, considering the certainty of death and the uncertainty of life, do make these presents following my last will and Testament. I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Catharine Quiddley the house and land whereon I now live to her and her heirs forever. I also give unto my beloved wife Catharine Quiddley twenty five acres of land on the Ingrean Island to her and her heirs forever. I also give unto my beloved wife Catharine Quiddley one negro man by the name of Peter to her and her heirs forever. I also give unto my beloved wife Catharine Quiddley one cow and calf, one sow and pig, and six dry hogs, and all my moveable property within doors and without, not before given away in this will, say one horse, one cart, one net, one chest, and various other articles too tedious to mention. I give and bequeath unto my beloved brothers and sisters viz to the heirs of J. P. Quiddley five shillings to be equally divided amongst them, to the heirs of Demoy Quiddley five shillings, to be equally divided amongst them, to Joseph Quiddley five shillings, to Peggy Austin five shillings, to Bartlett Quiddley five shillings and to Sally Quiddley five shillings, and I hereby nominate, constitute and appoint my beloved wife Catharine Quiddley my whole and sole executrix

after paying all my just debts and legacies as above stated, to this my last will and Testament, reciting all and every other will or wills by me made. My witnesses my hand the 14th day of March 1818.

The last will and Testament of Josiah Dowdy Junr  
deceased. Exhibited and proved at Novm. term 1818.

In the name of God, amen. I Josiah Dowdy Junr of the state of North Carolina and Currituck county, being sick and weak in body, but of sound mind and memory, thanks be to God for the same, calling to mind the mortality of my body and knowing that it appointed for all men once to die do make and declare this my last will and Testament, in manner following.

I give and bequeath unto my sister Grace Dowdy my land on the banks, to her and her heirs forever. I also give unto Grace Dowdy my sister one feather bed and furniture, to her and her heirs forever. I have sixty dollars in a note to be applied in paying of my debts. I have my mare saddle and bridle to be sold. I also leave my linen sheet, my gun and my half of a cart to be sold, and the money arising from the sale of said articles to be applied to payment of debts. I also all other articles belonging to my estate to be sold.

Lastly, I appoint Thomas Payne my executor. In witness whereof I have written with my hand and seal this 20th day of September 1818.
