that is to say. Item. I bind unto my wife Sarah Morse all my lands and  
plantations, and all the rest of my property within doors and without, during  
her widowhood. Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Ann Morse  
one negro boy named Miles, and one linen wheel, to her and her heirs forever.  
Item. I bind unto my daughter Elizabeth Dotey the use of negro woman Ruth  
during her life, and after her death I give and bequeath said negro woman  
Ruth unto all her children. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Elizabeth  
Dotey the sum of twenty five dollars, to her and her heirs forever. —  
Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Polly Bray all the property in her  
possession, which I have before left her, and one negro woman named Susannah  
to her and her heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath unto my son  
Thomas Morse, one bed and furniture, one cow and calf, one set of black  
smith tools, and one hundred dollars in cash of the money I have on hand  
to him and his heirs forever. Item. I give and bequeath unto my son William  
B. Morse, that tract of land I bought of John Sparre, one yoke of steers, one  
bed and furniture, one cow and calf, one ewe and lamb, one sow, and pigs, to  
him and his heirs forever. — Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Sarah  
Morse and her heirs to be free at the age of eighteen, one bed and furniture, one linen  
wheel, one cow and calf, and one negro boy named Miles, to her and her heirs  
forever. Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Julia Morse and her  
heirs to be free when she arrives to the age of fifteen, one bed and furniture, one  
linen wheel, two hundred dollars in cash of the money I have on hand, and one  
negro girl child named Jenny, to her and her heirs forever. —  
Item. I give and bequeath unto my two sons David and Wilson A. Morse  
the land and plantation whereon I now live, to be equally divided between  
them; also negro man Jack, and one bed and furniture, equally between them  
and their heirs forever. Item. I also give and bequeath unto my two sons David  
Morse and Wilson A. Morse all the remainder of my estate not given away  
in legacies, within doors and without, to be equally divided between them, to them  
and their heirs forever. I constitute make and ordain my sons Thomas Morse  
and William B. Morse Executors, and my Sarah Morse Executrix, to  
this my last will and testament, hereby revoking and making void all former  
will and bequeathes by me made, and acknowledging this only, to be my

of my wife, one negro man named Jeffrey, to her and her heirs forever. —  
Item. I give and bequeath unto my daughter Polly Hobbes one negro man named  
March, one half of the whole of my books, to her and her heirs forever. — also I  
give the use of that tract of land wherein Lucy Hobbes now lives, bounded by  
a line of marked trees, called Sixty acres to my daughter Polly Hobbes and her  
husband Quincy Hobbes jointly, during their natural lives, and after the death of  
either, I give and bequeath the said land to the one who longest survives to him  
and their heirs forever. I also give and bequeath unto my daughter Polly Hobbes one  
bed and furniture, which she now has in possession, to her and her heirs forever. —

man Jeffre to my grand daughter Penelope Ethridge, to her and her heirs forever.  
It is my will and desire that if my old negro man Jeffre should live until he  
cannot support himself, that he should be supported out of my estate. —  
My will and desire is that the remainder of my estate not already given  
away, shall be sold by my executors, and after paying my just debts, funeral

Item. I give unto my wife Nancy Tatums, all the corn and pork in the house when I die, and likewise all the cows and wheat, that is growing on the land, at the time
