In the name of God Amen. I Bryan Glisson of the  
 County of Duplin and State of N<sup>c</sup> Carolina. Being in a low  
 State of health but of sound and perfect mind and memory &  
 knowing that it is appointed for all men to die do make &  
 ordain this to be my last will and testament in the manner  
 as follows viz: First. my soul to the Almighty God who gave  
 it me. Second my body to be Buried at the Cross Roads in  
 a decent Christian manner at the discretion of my Executors.  
 And then after all my worldly debts and funeral expenses be  
 paid the remainder of my property be distributed in the  
 following manner. First. I give and bequeath to my  
 wife Sally Glisson ten cents also I lend to her during her  
 life time or widowhood two hundred & forty acres of land  
 where Joseph Walker now lives and one quarter more by the name  
 of Dove then after her death or marriage I give the said  
 land and more to my son Abraham Glisson & his heirs  
 for ever with the Quarters of the more. Second. I give and  
 bequeath to my daughter Golphia Ann Glisson ten cents  
 to her and her heirs for ever. Thirdly. I give and bequeath  
 to my son Bryan H. Glisson ten cents to him and his heirs  
 forever. Fourthly. I give and bequeath to my two younger  
 daughters Sally Jean Glisson and Susannah Glisson the two  
 Cheap land and the Cross-road land and the Lube Spring  
 land containing by estimation in all three pieces eight  
 hundred and eight acres. Also six cows to be put out on  
 Stocks on their lands which property to be divided equally between  
 the two - also I give Sally Jean one feather bed and furniture.  
 Fifthly. I give to my brother Abraham Glisson the sum of

one hundred and fifty dollars in cash. Sixthly. I give  
 and bequeath to my Brother Stephen H. Glisson the sum  
 of one hundred dollars in cash. Seventhly. I give and  
 bequeath to Bryan Cherry the Son of W<sup>m</sup> Cherry the  
 sum of sixty dollars for my Executors to buy him  
 said Bryan a horse. Eighthly I give and bequeath to  
 W<sup>m</sup> B. Komegay the Son of George F. Komegay the sum  
 of fifty dollars to be put in his fathers hands to buy  
 him a horse. Ninthly. I then leave all the rest of  
 my property that shall be found after the legacies  
 be given up to be sold and and equally divided between  
 my three youngest Children. Tenthly. My wearing  
 cloaths to be equally divided between my two brothers  
 Abraham and Stephen H. Glisson. Lastly for my Executors  
 I do nominate and appoint my brothers Abraham  
 Glisson and Stephen H. Glisson. Nothing to debar this  
 from being my last will and testament revoking  
 all other former wills and testaments in witness where-  
 unto. I have hereunto set my hand and fixed my seal  
 this second day of August 1824. Witnesses present Samuel  
 Davis. David Alburtson.
