possess at the time of my decease I dispose of it
as followeth I will that all my just debts be
paid out such part of my personal property not
expressly hereafter mentioned in this will as my
Executors may think can be best spared from the
use of my family. My eldest son Isaac Olin
has received of my property which I estimate at
seven hundred Dollars and as I have lately such
certain intelligence that he is dead and his wife
