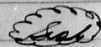

Likewise it is my will that all my children and my wife make no division but all have together to such times as my wife should marry or that the children shall come to age then as they come to age give them all their share and if my wife marry give her all of her share. Likewise I ordain and appoint my beloved wife ~~Lizzy~~ Mary Magdalen Powell and Alexander Holden my Executors to this my last will and testament. Also I order and appoint Robert Dickson overseer and guardian to see my children justly delt with according to this my last will and testament &c. By these presents I declare this my last will and testament revoking all other wills and testaments made by me either in words or writing and then only to stand. In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and first my seal the Day and year first above above written &c. Signed Sealed published and declared in the presence of us. In the Name of God Amen December 12th 1820.
This my last and solemn will & testimony. That my state of bodily health at present is very low. Yet now in my perfect senses I am not the least addled or delirious. I give and bequeath all my possession of Land on the East side of the new Road to my son Wile after the death of his mother including the manner plantation. I give and bequeath all the land I possess lying between the new Road and old road to my son Sampson after the death of his mother I give and bequeath all my Land lying over the old road on the West side of said to my son Hugh. N.B. Should either of my two youngest sons die before he comes of age his youngest brother shall have his her portion of land. I Loan to my son Eluander the bed he lays on and furniture during his life time and \$25 left in the hands of my Executor at his disposal. I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary \$5 all the stock both consisting of cattle and hogs on my premises marked with a smoke crop in the right ear I disclaim I give and bequeath them to my son Hugh one cow and calf one 2 year old heifer marked with a crop and slit half moon in the right ear. I give and bequeath to my son Wile, one cow and calf and 2 year old heifer marked with a crop & slit and half moon in the left ear. I give and bequeath to my son grandson I lend to Cytha my beloved wife 2 cows and calves one 3 year old heifer &

one 2 year old heifer the choice of my stock. I allow her one feather bed and furniture during her life, allow all my plantation tools and plowing team during her life allow 2 give her 10 hogs the choice of all my stock the balance of my perishable property I leave to be sold and after my debts is paid and equal divided among all, and Ruthage part let out on interest for her children. - this my will I make in my solid senses and witness whereof I here in to set my hands and seal.

In the name of God amen I John Phillips of the State of the State of North Carolina and County of Duplin being aged and infirm but at the same time of sound and perfect memory blessed be God do this Fifth Day month in the year of our Lord Christ one thousand eight hundred and twenty three make and ordain this my last will and Testament in manner and form following viz. first. I recommend my soul to God that gave it me & my body to the ground to have decent and Christian burial at the direction of my Executor hereafter to be named - 2^d I will and ordain that my Executors do sell as much of my Estate as will pay all my just debts and funeral expenses out of such things as can be

be best spared - 3^d my will and desire is that my beloved wife Dorothy Phillips do have quite and peaceable possession of the buildings when I now live and the one third of the Land and plantation when I now live on the south side of the great swamp during her natural life at her decease to be the property of my son Thomas Phillips and of his heirs forever. 4th I give to my beloved wife Dorothy Phillips one negro wench slave named Doll during her natural life and at her my said wife's decease to be the property together with the increase she may hereafter have to my two daughters Francis Phillips and Mary Phillips and the heirs of their bodies lawfully begotten forever. 5th I will and ordain that all my plantation tools and plantation utensils, household furniture and cattle do remain with my wife Dorothy Phillips on the plantation during her natural life and that at her decease the said plantation tools household furniture and cattle except such articles as may hereafter be willed to them equally divided amongst all my heirs - 6th I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Dorothy Phillips one negro doled ball and one feather bed and furniture to her and her heirs forever - 7th my will and desire is that the remainder of my house and manse remain in the possession of my said wife for her benefit during her natural life and that if any remain at her decease that they be the property of my two daughters Francis Phillips and Mary Phillips and the heirs of their bodies forever - 8th I give and bequeath to my daughter Francis Phillips one negro girl named Jenny and one feather bed and furniture, to her and her heirs forever of her body lawfully begotten. 9th I give and bequeath to my daughter Mary Phillips one
