Last Will and Testament

I, I. G. Young Manney of the aforesaid County and State, being of sound mind but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence do make and declare this my last will and testament:

First, my executors hereinafter named, shall give my body a decent burial suitable to the wishes of my friends and relatives and pay all funeral expenses together with all my just debts out of the first money which may come into his hands belonging to my estate.

Second, I give and devise my land known as a part of the old home place being an interest of about 40 acres more or less to my two nephews Morris Clark and Wiley Clark to be equally divided and I give Morris Clark the sum of forty dollars in Cash and I give Wiley Clark the sum of forty dollars cash and I also give and bequeath to Wiley Clark my bedstead and bedding for same also one bureau.

To Wiley Clark one bedstead and bedding for
Same also one bureau.

Item Third I give and bequeath to Zilla
Johnson Arrowood forty dollars in Gold and Silver.
Item fourth I give and bequeath to Ida Munney
wife of Nathan Munney the sum of Forty dollars
in gold and silver and one small trunk I give
to her

Item fifth I give to Sybilla Clark one bedstead
and bedding for the same and also one chest
and table.

Item Sixth I give to my sister Elizabeth Clark
the sum of Twenty dollars.

Item Seventh I give and bequeath all the balance
of property not above disposed of to Wiley Clark.
And lastly I do hereby appoint Wiley Clark my
lawful Executor to execute this my last will
and testament to the true intent and meaning
of the same.
