First: All my just debts and funeral expenses shall be first fully paid.

Second: I give, devise and bequeath to my wife Harriett Jackson and my son Ulysses N. Jackson the home (or my residence house running on street due west with street to and including one half of the well, to have and to hold to their, my said wife and son and to their assigns forever. And I give devise and bequeath to my daughter Viola Jackson all rest of the lot with house line on street commencing at the center of the well and running thence due west to Robert Taylor's corner; thence North with Taylor's line to Gilus Smith, thence East to same width as front, thence south to the center of the well on to the street. To have and to hold for her and to her assigns forever.

And personal property tool etc. may sold to meet any expense on my estate.

Third: I nominate and appoint Thomas R. Adams to be the Executor of this my last will and testament, hereby revoking all former wills by me made.
