

I, William M. Robinson of the aforesaid county and state being of sound mind but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make and declare this my last will and testament:

First: I give and devise to my beloved wife Margaret L. Robinson all my personal property that I may be possessed of at my decease consisting of household and kitchen furniture, farming utensils, stock of cattle, hogs, horses, mules and every and all other personal property of which I may be possessed and any money that I may have on hand after my burial expenses and legal debts are paid.

Second: I give and bequeath to my minor son Otho B. Robinson to be held and used by my wife untill he becomes of age a certain tract of land described and bounded as follows (to-wit:) Beginning at a stone Dickson's corner and runs thence N.  $2\frac{3}{4}$  E. 33 poles to a stone near a branch; thence W. 55 poles to a stake in a road; thence S. 20 W. 52 poles to a white oak; thence E. 34 poles to a stake; thence S. 69 E. 30 poles to a stone; thence S. 9 E. 69 poles to a stone; thence S. 31 E. 29 poles to a stake; thence N. 13 W.  $117\frac{6}{10}$  poles to a stone with pointers E. of the shoal branch; thence N.  $2\frac{3}{4}$  E.  $26\frac{1}{8}$  poles to the beginning, containing 30 acres more or less also one other tract: Beginning at a stake Wm. Robinson's and J.T. Dickson's corner and runs thence N.  $6\frac{1}{4}$  W.  $9\frac{1}{2}$

stone; thence S. 9 E. 69 poles to a stone; thence S. 31 E. 29 poles to a stake; thence N. 13 W. 117  $\frac{6}{10}$  poles to a stone with pointers E. of the shoal branch; thence N.  $2\frac{3}{4}$  E.  $26\frac{1}{8}$  poles to the beginning, containing 30 acres more or less also one other tract: Beginning at a stake Wm. Robinson's and J.T. Dickson's corner and runs thence N.  $6\frac{1}{4}$  W.  $9\frac{1}{2}$  poles to a stake on W.D. Hanna's line; thence N.  $88\frac{3}{4}$  E. 8 poles running with W.D. Hanna's line to a stake on said Hanna's line; thence S. 6 E. 81 poles to a stone Wm. Robinson's corner; thence S.  $29\frac{1}{2}$  W. 12 poles to the beginning, containing  $3\frac{7}{8}$  acres more or less.

Third: I hereby appoint my beloved son I. Sloan Robinson my lawful executor to all intents and purposes to execute this my last will and testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same.
