

Last will and testament of W. T. Hall-

I, W. T. Hall, being of sound mind and body, but knowing the uncertainties of life, and being anxious to secure the future welfare of those dependent upon me, do hereby dispose of my effects as follows:

1. If my wife, Ellen Hall, and my youngest daughter Nellie Hall, both survive me, I will and bequeath to them jointly at my death, my land in Gaston County, N.C., my insurance money, my household and kitchen furniture and whatever cash I may at the time be possessed of, but on these conditions: (a) If my wife, Ellen Hall survive my daughter, Nellie, she is to inherit Nellie's share of these properties. (b) If my daughter Nellie survive my wife, Ellen, she is to inherit her mother's share of these properties.

2. If my wife Ellen, do not survive me, I hereby will and bequeath to my daughter Nellie alone the properties described in (1) above.

3. Any other property of which I may at the time of my death be possessed is to be divided among my legal heirs as the law directs.

4. I hereby appoint John Mandy Hall my only son, sole administrator of my estate, and direct that he shall serve without bond.
