I, Henry R. Priggen of the County of Hurdle and State of North Carolina
 being of Sound Mind and Memory do make and declare this my last
 Will and Testament in Manner and form following this is to say:
 Item 1st that my Executors hereinafter named shall provide for my
 body a decent burial suitable to the wishes of my relations and friends
 and pay all funeral expenses, together with all my just debts,
 from my own and to whomsoever owing out of the Estates then they
 first come into their hands as a part or parts of my estate
 Item 2nd I give and devise unto my beloved wife Mary T. Priggen
 during her natural life all my land, Money, Stock of every
 kind, Household and Kitchen Furniture, and in the meantime she the
 said Mary T. Priggen may give off to each child their respective
 legacies hereinafter named
 Item 3rd I give to my son H. R. Priggen after the death of his mother
 Mary T. Priggen one half of my land, one horse, Bridle and
 Saddle, one Cow and Calf, one Sow and pigs, two ploughs, and
 gear, one Horse Cart, one Bed and its necessary furniture to
 him and the lawful begotten heirs of his body forever
 Item 4th I give to Edward Rouse and Edw and Rouse each
 one Bed and its necessary furniture, to them and the lawful beget-
 ten heirs of their body them surviving, but if they leave no issue the
 to come back to my children Henry R. Elizabeth J. Nancy, Sarah
 & Mrs. Hill
 Item 5th I give to my daughter Mary B. Hill wife of D. C. Hill
 1/4 part of the remainder of my land and if she die without
 issue lawfully begotten of her body then to come back to my
 other four children Henry R. Elizabeth J. Nancy and Sarah E.
 Item 6th I give to my daughter Nancy, Elizabeth J. and Sarah E.
 Priggen the balance of my land to them and their heirs,
 also one Bed and its necessary furniture each to them and
 the lawful begotten heirs of their body forever
 My Will is that if any of my children before mentioned shall
 die without heirs lawfully begotten of their body then during
 their lifetime the legacies herein given shall come back
 to the survivors or survivors of my children & the lawful

begotten heirs of their body them surviving forever
 and lastly I hereby nominate and appoint my son Henry R.
 Priggen my lawful executor to execute this my last Will
 & Testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same
 hereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other Wills and
 Testaments by me heretofore made

In the name of God Amen, I John Reddick of the State of North Carolina, being very senescent in body, but of perfect mind and memory calling to mind the mortality of my body, knowing that it is appointed for all men to die, do make and Ordain this my last will and Testament, first of all I recommend my Soul into the hands of Almighty God whosoever it is, nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again, may the mighty power of God, and as Touching my worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I give, divide and dispose of the following manner form to wit: I lend my loving wife Martha Reddick my Dish, thousand and com Mills in the mill field, and the Orchard field her natural life, I lend the Orchard also to my wife till Benjamin Reddick is twenty one years old, then one fourth part of the Orchard to my wife Martha her natural life, I lend the mill to my wife till Benjamin Reddick is twenty five years old, also I lend my Shop to my wife till my son is twenty five years old, a plenty of fire wood and vice timber and acton timbers sufficient to support all this I have lent to my wife, the Orchard, the Mill the Shop to be given up when the time mentioned in the will doth come, I also lend to my wife two beds, Stools and furniture also three hogs and one cow, two Cows and calves, forty head of hogs, Ten head of Sheep, the kitchen furniture, two tables, twelve chairs, all the Bannels, Hannah & Rachel, and Sarah and Mary and Tom and Peter Brady and Jobe, and their increase and three plows & Gear, provisions & wheels of every kind, & glass house furniture except my bed & bedstead and runs my wife her natural life, after her death then to my son Benjamin Reddick

2. I give to my son Benjamin Reddick all the rest of my lands forever and to his immediate use, and one pair, one horse, and the new bed and bedstead, one negro man Jim, and one negro boy Jim, and negro woman by the name of Chesey, and after his mother's death, I give all my property, consisting of rice and pericahoe after his mother's death to Benjamin Reddick forever

3. If Benjamin Reddick dies and leaves no heirs lawfully begotten of his body, all my lands on the North East side of the driving branch I give to William Taylor, I give all the rest of my land on the North West side of the driving branch, to Isaac Taylor son of John Taylor
