And this deponent further saith, that the said Susan Robertson the testator aforesaid, did, at the time of subscribing his name as aforesaid, declare the said paper writing so subscribed by him, and exhibited, to be his last will and Testament and this deponent did thereupon subscribe his name at the end of said will as an attesting witness thereto, and at the request and in the presence of said testator, and this deponent further saith that at the said time when the said testator subscribed his name to the said last will as aforesaid, and at the time of the deponent's subscribing his name as an attesting witness thereto as aforesaid, the said Susan Robertson was of sound mind and memory, of full age to execute a will and was not under any restraint to the knowledge, information or belief of this deponent. In the name of God Amen, I John Reddick of the State of North Carolina Leno County being very sensible in body, but of perfect mind and memory calling to mind the mortality of my body, knowing that it is appointed for all men to die, do make and Ordain this my last will and Testament, first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God and thus give it, nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again. May the mighty power of God, and as touching my worldly estate wherewith it hath pleased God to bless me with in this life I give, divide and dispose of the following manner form to wit: I lend my loving wife Martha Reddick my five hundred and some mules in the mill feed and the orchard feed her natural life, I lend the orchard also to my wife like Benjamin Reddick is twenty one years old, then one fourth part of the orchard to my wife Martha her natural life. I lend the mill to my wife like Benjamin Reddick is twenty five years old, also I lend my Shop to my wife like my son is twenty five years old, a plenty of fire wood and nice timber and acton timbers sufficient to support all this I have lent to my wife, the orchard, the mill the Shop to be given up when the time mentioned in the will does come, I also lend to my wife two beds, dress and furniture also three horses and one cart, two cows and calves, forty head of hogs, ten head of sheep, the kitchen furniture, two tables, twelve chairs, all the Bannels, blankets & Rachel, and Sarah and Mary and Tom and Peter & Brady and Jobe, and their increase and three plows & gear, provisions & wheels of every kind & great house furniture except my bed & bedstead and unto my wife her natural life, after her death then to my son Benjamin Reddick.

2. I give to my son Benjamin Reddick all the rest of my lands forever and to his immediate use, and one gun, one horse, and the new bed and bedstead, one negro man Jim, and one negro boy Jim, and negro woman by the name of Chesey, and after his mother's death, I give all my property, consisting of rice and peristake after his mother's death to Benjamin Reddick forever.

3. If Benjamin Reddick dies and leaves no heirs lawfully begotten of his body, all my lands on the North East side of the driving branch I give to William Taylor, I give all the rest of my land on the North West side of the driving branch, to Isaac & Ayron son of John Taylor.

4th If Benjamin Reddick dies leaving no heirs lawfully begotten of his body, I give all my property, real and personal to my beloved wife Martha Reddick her natural life also I give the loom and gear to my wife Martha Reddick, I give my Saddle and bridle and all my wearing cloths to Benjamin Reddick I give my wife her two Saddles

5th If Benjamin Reddick dies and leaves no heirs, on dies before he is old enough to receive his property and after my wife Martha Reddick death the perishable property to be equally divided between William Williams and Runcison Williams and Benjamin Williams, Sons of John Williams and Joseph Williams and I further nominate and appoint my loving wife Martha Reddick my whole and sole executrix to this my last will and Testament, whereof I have hereunto set my hand, this 28th day of March 1815, Call on John Williams and Joseph Williams and William Holliday to prove this my last will, they know my hand writing

The within last will and Testament of Jno. Reddick dec'd was exhibited before the Court and the Court being satisfied this is had heretofore been admitted to Probate as per Minutes of said Court at February Term 1820 in regular form as follows, viz: The last will and Testament of Jno. Reddick was exhibited and proven by the oath of John Ralchen Brody Belcher and Joseph Williams who swore that they believed the body of the will as well as the signatures to the hand writing of Jno. Reddick dec'd. and Jno. Williams swore he found the said will among the valuable papers of the dec'd Mrs. Reddick the widow of Jno. Reddick dec'd. the Executrix therein named came into Court and presented her executrix Jno. Williams was appointed administrator with the will annexed and entered into bond, ordered that letters Testamentary issue accordingly, and the Clerk at that time having failed to certify and record the same it is ordered that the Justice Clerk, viz: William Williams certify and record the same
