Last-Will
and Testament
of John Reddick

In the name of God Amen, I John Reddick of the State of North Carolina, Mecklenburg County being very unwell in body, but of perfect mind and memory, calling to mind the mortality of my body, knowing that I am appointed for all men to die, do make and ordain this my Last-Will and Testament, first of all I recommend my soul into the hands of Almighty God that give it nothing doubting but I shall receive the same again, May the mighty power of God, and as touching my worldly estate wherewithal I have pleased God to bless me with in this life I give, divide and dispose of the following manner and toward:

- I bind my loving wife Martha Reddick my lady thousand cows cattle in the Mill field and the orchard field her natural life, I bind the orchard also to my wife till Benjamin Reddick is twenty one years old, then one fourth part of the orchard to my wife Martha her natural life, I bind the Mill to my wife till Benjamin Reddick is twenty five years old, also I bind my Shop to my wife till my Son is twenty five years old, A plenty of fine wood and nice timber and other timbers sufficient to support all this I have left to my wife, the orchard, the Mill, the Shop to be given up when the time mentioned in the will does come, I also bind to my wife two beds, Sheets and furniture, also three horses and one Cart, two cows and calves, forty head of hogs, Ten head of Sheep, the kitchen furniture, two tables, twelve chairs, all the Bibles, Hymns & Psalms, and Sarah and Mary and Tom and Peter Brady and wife, and their increase and three slaves & gear, provisions & wheels of every kind, & glass house furniture except my bed & bedstead and unto my wife her natural life, after her death then to my Son Benjamin Reddick
- I give to my Son Benjamin Reddick all the rest of my lands forever and to his immediate use and one gun, one horse, and the new bed and bedstead, one negro man Jim, and one negro boy Jim, and negro woman by the name of Cheesy, and after his mother death, I give all my property consisting of real and personalty after his mother death to Benjamin Reddick forever
- If Benjamin Reddick dies and leaves no heirs lawfully begotten of his body, all my lands on the North East side of the driving branch I give to Hilliard Taylor, I give all the rest of my land on the North West side of the driving branch to George & ayson son of John Taylor

4. If Benjamin Reddick dies leaving no heirs lawfully begotten
of his body, I give all my property, real and personal to my
beloved wife Martha Reddick her natural life. Also I give
the loom and gear to my wife Martha Reddick. I give my
Saddle and Bridle and all my weaving cloth to Benjamin Reddick.
I give my wife two Saddles.

5. If Benjamin Reddick die and leave no heirs, or die before he is old enough to receive his property and after my wife Martha Reddick's death the perishable property to be equally divided between William Williams and Pinchon Williams and Benjamin Williams, Son of John Williams and Joseph Williams and I further nominate and appoint my loving wife Martha Reddick my whole and sole executor to this my last will and testament whereof I have hereunto set my hand this 28th day of March 1816, call on John Williams and Joseph Williams and William Holliday to prove this my last will. They know my hand writing

the body of the Will as well as the signature to the hand
writing of Mrs. Reddick deceased and Mrs. Williams swore she

Mrs. Reddick the widow of Mrs. Reddick deceased the testatrix
therein named came into Court and requested her executrix
Mrs. Williams was appointed administrator with the will
