x Kinchen Hairwright of the County of Burke and State of North Carolina being of sound mind and memory but considering the uncertainty of earthly existence do make and declare this my last Will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say:— First, that my executors (herein after named) shall provide for my body a decent burial suitable to the wishes of my relatives and friends, and pay all funeral and just debts, howsoever and to whomsoever owing out of the money that may first come into their hands as a part or parcel of my estate.
Item:— I give and devise to my beloved wife one hundred and sixty acres of Land whereon I now live with all the houses and improvements, to have and to hold to her the said land, houses and improvements for and during the term of her natural life.
Item: I give and bequeath to my said beloved wife my bed and furniture, Household and Kitchen furniture, all my Cattle and Hogs all the crops of every description that may be upon the plantations whereon I now live and all the provisions on hand at the time of my death, to have and hold for and during her natural life.
Item: I give and bequeath to my son Jacob Hairwright five dollars as his portion of my estate, which amount is to be paid after the death of my wife. Item: My will and desire is that after the death of my wife, after taking out the debts and legacies above mentioned my estate shall be sold and the debts paid and the surplus over and above, shall be equally divided in equal portions to my five children, Alfred Hairwright, Abby Murphy, wife of James Murphy, Catherine Murphy, wife of James Murphy, Kinchen Hairwright & and to the Heirs of James Hairwright and share alike to them and each and every of them their executors, administrators and assigns absolutely forever.
And lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my trusty friends John T. Bennett and Colbert A. Moore my lawful executors to all intents and purposes, to execute this my last will and testament

According to the true intent and meaning of the same and every part and clause thereof, thereby revoking and declaring utterly void all other Wills and Testaments by some heretofore made.
