lately on Shandwick Hall doth in equality succeed him
both.

12th And witnesseth my hand day all the land that may
be required or what you shall have to be sold and the
goods & chattels to be delivered to the sum of all the money
I possess, and the attorney of the Plaintiff signs, is to be
paid worthy him and James William & Robert, each
one of them half day in consideration of the value of their
neglects, errors & losses, but if they shall not be
payable when money is given, then to make & take
the goods & chattels that he will at his best sale by
the Committee, and have and keep the same,
and it is further my will that whenever I need it
Not having money to be paid at his best sale
late notwithstanding, and before or after the same
say the Committee shall be equally bound & obliged
to me and James William & Robert.
And now I sign my last Will & Testament
Robert Cummens & Elizabeth Wharton testifying to this
My last Will and Testament made & pronounced
this first day January to set the hand & signature
of the Testator this fifteenth day of January One
Thousand Eighteen hundred & Eighty four.

so that he may have his chance to serve you and to prove
himself a good man to you and to your service. I
