Will and Testament in that his property shall be divided  
Andrew Ferguson the eldest shall have one Dollar, Robert next  
eldest shall have one Dollar, John Ferguson next eldest shall  
have one Dollar the rest of the property is to be divided, The  
Janney Ferguson his Wife and her two Daughters is to have  
all the house in furniture these two Daughters to have one  
each a piece, William and Thomas to tend the ground and have  
half what they make untill Samuel the youngest son comes  
of age and then by maintaining his Mother her life time if she  
stays with him, and by paying William and Thomas fifty Dollars  
a piece in hand at her Decease he is to have the Land, the Cattle  
and and hogs and Sheep is for the use of the family, the fifteen  
Dollars not against Roland and the account Seventy Dollars  
against Andrew Ferguson for the purpose of buying a work  
book for the use of the family

March the 26 in the year of our Lord one thousand  
Eight hundred and five knowing that I am Most at Weak  
this my last Will and Testament, being in my reason  
first of all recommend my Soul to God who gave Me I  
also all my just debts to be paid Next, recommend my  
Loving Wife and Children to the care of our Lord and Savior  
Jesus Christ with my family and have hold and  
appoint my Wife and Son Roland my Administrators in  
during Widshood leave it to her care with the Counsel  
and Sec of the three eldest Brother with the joint Consent  
may hold or give to any of the other Brothers if they  
are 20 years of age Land or Value and what I should  
an Ephraim has had I allow them keep I allow an  
equal Division Making the youngest as much as the  
eldest I allow my Blacks as the raise up Children to be  
let free upon their Good behaviour at 20 years of age  
The Children  
to be bar fullness  
to the youngest Brothers  
he ought to have less than the rest  
in regard of his Trade
