This is the last Will and Testament of me Eliza Harriett
Molyneux the widow of Edmund Molyneux Her Britannic
Majestys late Consul for the State of Georgia in North America
whereas my late dear husband by his Will dated the seventeenth
day of September one thousand eight hundred and sixty
four after giving a legacy therein mentioned devised and
bequeathed to me all the residue of his property both real and
personal in England and America And whereas my said
dear husband made such Will with the full knowledge that
our children were as dear to me as to himself and that in
the event of my surviving him I might have opportunity
as our children should severally settle in life of making
such dispositions for their respective benefit as the circumstances
of each case should in my discretion require And whereas
seeing that it may not live to carry these objects into execution
and that our children were equal in their Fathers affection
as they are in mine I desire to divide the property equally
between them in the manner hereinafter mentioned And
therefore I appoint my son Colonel Molyneux and my
friend Henry Royle of Liverpool Merchant to be the Executors
and Trustees of this my Will and I give devise and
bequeath to them and to their heirs executors administrators
and assigns according to the nature of the property all my
estate and effects whatsoever and wheresoever whether real or
personal or whether in America England or elsewhere
