

In the name of God I, <sup>my</sup> John Wilkins of the County of Hyde  
and State of North Carolina Planter, Being Sick and weak in  
body last of sound and perfect memory, thank be to God  
for the same do make and ordain this my last will & testament  
in manner and form as follows viz. Inasmuch as I have to  
my beloved wife Margaret Wilkins one third of my manner  
Plantation situate on Broad Line during her natural life.  
I have also given unto my beloved wife Margaret Wilkins at  
her disposal two negro men and one girl namely Joseph & Abel  
Likewise I give unto her the fourth part of the negro man John  
Bed and furniture the choice of three cows & calves out of my stock & I give  
I have also given and Bequeath unto my daughter the Bride Wilkins one  
negro boy named Abe and one negro girl named Din & I like-  
wise I have her a piece of land on Broad Line to be sold at my decease  
and the money put to interest till she comes of age, I have also  
Bequeath unto my son Edmund Wilkins the manner Plantation  
after my wife's decease and if my son Edmund should die before he comes  
to age then it shall fall to my daughter the Bride & I likewise Bequeath  
my son Edmund the 22 negro men namely Din, Aaron and his wife Din  
& I likewise I have my two negro women namely Jim and doll then &  
then I reserve unto my children to be Equally divided when my  
youngest child comes to age. Then my desire is that all my  
goods and Chattels and other property not named in this my  
will be sold at my decease and Equally divided between my  
wife and children. Lastly, I Bequeath and ordain that  
John Wilkins & Jacob Wilkins sole Executors of this my last will  
and testament do allow all other wills heretofore by me made  
confirming this only to be my last will and testament. In  
testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand & fixed  
my seal this twentieth Day of January in the year of our Lord one  
Thousand seven hundred & ten - 1810

In the name of God I, <sup>my</sup> John Wilkins of the County of Hyde & State  
of North Carolina being not sick in body but of perfect  
understanding & memory considering the uncertainty of this life  
& being desirous to leave that small estate and furniture I have to  
me with in my family with as much peace and union as may be I  
do make this my last will & testament in manner following to wit  
Revoking all former wills by me made, first I Bequeath my soul to  
God the giver and my body to be decently buried at the discretion of my  
Executors and as to my temporal estate after paying of my just debts  
I give & devise and dispose of the same as follows &c. First I give  
& Bequeath unto my wife Elizabeth today & children one third  
part of all my stock of Cattle four & feather beds & furniture, also  
one half of all my crops & one half of all my sheep, also I give  
unto my wife &c. Their first choice of my horses, I also give  
unto them one half of all my house & kitchen furniture to  
Remain in common until the death of my wife or  
marriage or my children come with age then to be Equally  
divided, also I give unto my wife & children in like manner the  
following negroes To wit, one negro man named Gab & one negro  
man named Prince, also all my negro women & their children to  
them & their heirs for ever. Secondly I give & Bequeath unto my  
wife & children all the rest of my negroes to be Equally divided  
among them & to be held and conveyed until my children  
come with age and for them to receive their Legacies in Colours  
satisfactory with age to them & their heirs for ever. Thirdly -  
I wish all the rest of my considerable estate to be sold without  
doubt hereunto used for the payment of my just debts -  
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
