

I, Eldon Jasper of Hyde County do make and ordain this to be my last will and testament in manner and form as follows, In witness whereof I give to my son Eldon the Plantation and all the Lands thereunto belonging whereon I now live to him and his heirs forever I give to my son Eldon my Mahogany Dining Table & table of pine two pattern beds & furniture & say to each one bed & quilt two pair Blankets 2 pair sheets pillow & a counterpane to each bed to him & his heirs forever I give to my son Eldon my writing and portable Desk to give with the following negroes But with his son George, cupbearer George Ray Edmund, Phibey, Willis, Willey, Wiley - I give to my son Eldon my Mahogany Bureau light chair with a sofa two bed & furniture & above described as to the furniture with an mahogany tea table all the sportsman in his name, together with the following negroes two Jars, Bob, Kent, Kala, Levi, man, Indian, Bisher, Rara, Tony, Lucy, Kith, when & his heirs forever I give to my daughter Patsy the Plantation I own at Glades Cross to her & her heirs forever. I give my son Eldon Madison my watch and gold chain. I give one negro Eldest to him & his heirs forever all my stock I wish sold together with such things not immediately mentioned. Some house hold & kitchen furniture at the usual market. Each of my children I give one suit of clothes. I should prefer some good furniture to live in the house, and all the building wood in with their children kept in the Plantation in such houses as my executor may bargain or agree. I give to my son Eldon one hundred & forty acres of Land purchased of James Jewell to him and his heirs forever. I give to Patsy one negro girl Roxanna with one bed and Mahogany Dining Table. I give to my daughter Patsy one golden toilet with my smallest gold ring. Eldon taking my mourning Ring at the age of five years I wish Mrs. Rodham to have the offer of Patsy to bring up. I give my son Eldon one mahogany double stand. I do appoint my friends Thomas Henry Belmont, William Belmont & John B. Jasper Executors to this my last will and testament Revoking all others. in testimony whereof I have hereunto set my hand & seal this thirteenth day of July 1812.

The children who did for Patsy to be in care of my sister Lucy until Patsy hath a suitable home. If my Belmont will take Eldon until he is five years old, I wish him to do so. I wish to be paid annually during her life, such of my property not mentioned to be sold, and equally divided between the two children, the 14th of July 1812. Eldon Jasper to be executed & give my boy chain and a set of silver to my daughter Patsy.

State of North Carolina, that I William Daily do make this my last will & testament in manner & form following, viz. I give and bequeath to my wife Elizabeth Daily one negro woman named Lucinda, and all her children at the time of my death. I also give her two negro women Rebecca & Leake together with my horse & chaise & harness, I also give her two beds and furniture, together with the rest of the House & kitchen furniture. I also give her half my stock of sheep & all my sheep if they die, and thirty head a year of corn & best turneps. I bequeath to my place I thirty barrels of corn also one hundred pounds in debt which are third of my stock of cattle. I leave to my son Samuel Daily all the residue of my property, whether real or personal till the age of twenty one years: if he should die before that time I leave no other children then give half my personal property to my wife Elizabeth Daily and the rest of my property whether real or personal to my relations on the part of my mother in England if any living there & none was Benjamin and James was the only

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living & he singular to me by years ago, a Daughter was found
who married one Anderson of this state he found I sold & gave
my Property to John Patton my wife's Brother But should my own
Line to the age of twenty one years then give him my property
my property by whatever means or personal to Dispose of as he may
think proper I will that you wish and old for he sold it out
as the perishable part of my property also that if she don't live
in three or four years & is dead Rhode to be sold if my
Executors think twelve months or at will make the property
bring a better price they will give it the part of my plantation
that my wife won't have I wish to lay out if it will not
produce one third of what may be made in it. The negroes
that is hired out the best advantage and to be particularly that
The negroes have three shirts three pairs of trousers one pair of
Woolen Cloth a good upper Jacket of Woolen Cloth also a new
Jacket with two pairs of shoes and blanket for year I wish
that my Executors would pay out to the best advantage all the simple
Income of Sammings property as well the sale of the negroes and
perishable property in young negroes not under six nor above
twelve years without it might be a valuable fellow, no girls
above fifteen or sixteen which my Executors by no means to
Lend the money at interest but to collect it and make the purchase
of the young negroes either at our state or ready money market
I wish my Executors to have the management of Sammings pro-
perty till he comes of age I do bequeath and appoint my
Executors Sammings Personal goods and all that they have
at the University till he is Eighteen years of age and by that time
I hope he will be master of the Latin & Greek languages also the
French together with the other Branches of Literature & I appoint
for him to continue the study of the Law with the same good
famous Judge Taylor if he should be a son of Law
William Parrish & John Adams my Executors.

County of Hyde being in firm in body but in perfect mind & memory
Do make & publish & appoint this my Last will & testament in manner
of form following, viz. First and principally of full time and reason
my soul into the hand of Almighty God that gave it and my
body & come out to the earth to be buried in a decent Christian
burial at the discretion of my Executors herein after named and as
touching such worldly estate as it hath pleased Almighty God
to bestow upon me in this life I give & dispose of the same in the
following manner & form, viz. - I give, my will and desire is that
my dearly beloved wife Milbela Gibbs shall have the use of my plan-
tation where I now live during her widowhood & so long as
I live and bequeath unto my dear young child fifty acres of land
where I now live, one negro girl named Deborah and all the cattle
and the sheep that is in his herds. I give & bequeath unto my daughter
Cassandra Harris one negro girl named Rast & one cow & calf. I
give and bequeath unto my daughter Mary Gibbs one negro girl
named Michael and feather bed & four meters & three barrels of
our hogs and the sermons that I bought at my brother Thomas
Gibbs Van due. I give and bequeath unto my daughter the line
Gibbs one negro girl named holdah and feather bed & furniture &
two cows & calves one hog & my sermons. I give and be-
queath unto my two sons, Washington & Henry Gibbs all the
remainder part of my land on the ridge part already bequeath-
ed to be Equally divided between them both.

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
