I Aaron Massengill Sr. of the County of Johnston and State of North Carolina being of sound mind & memory but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence do make and declare this my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say

First That my executor herein after named shall provide for my body a decent burial suitable to the wishes of my friends and relatives and pay all funeral expenses together with my just debts howsoever and to whomsoever owing out of the monies that may first come into his hands as a part or parcel of my estate

Item I give and devise to my beloved wife one bed and furniture and one chest and one side saddle case of knives and forks and six teaspoons and six cup plates and one set of plates and one set of cups and saucers and one glass tumbler and one glass salt set and one roan mare and one iron pot and one dutch oven and one skillet and one coffee pot and one coffee mill and two washing tubs one water pail and one chest and one wheel and one pair of cards and one loom and gear and two tables and one wash basin and one plow and set of gear and two flat irons and two tin buckets and one knife box and one shovel and pair of tongs and eighty one acres and a half of land including my present residence adjoining the lands of Suther Byrd and others and I also lend my said wife during her life or widowhood fifty acres of land adjoining the other tract and Robert Massengill Jr and two cows and calves her choice and six sitting chairs and one hard stand and one scalding stand and one sow and pigs or shoats and four head of sheep her choice and one years support for herself and family

Item I give to my son Aaron Massengill Jr one bed, bedstead and furniture and one roan horse and one rifle gun and fifteen dollars in money to be payed by my executor hereinafter named and one sow and pigs

Item I give to my daughter Margie Rebecca Massengill one bedstead, and furniture.

Item I give to my daughter Emily Elender Moassingill twenty dollars instead of one bed & furniture to be paid by my executor

Item I give to my daughter Dolany Barber wife of Jesse Barber one cow and pigs

Item My will and devise is that the residue of my estate if any after taking out the devises & legacies above mentioned shall be sold and the debts to me owing collected and if there should be any surplus over and above the payment of debts, expenses and legacies that such surplus shall be equally divided among all my children in equal proportion share and share alike to them and each of them, their executors and assigns absolutely forever and lastly I do hereby constitute and appoint my trusty friend Charles W. Bingham my lawful executor to all intent and purposes to execute this my last will and testament according to the true intent and meaning of the same and every part and clause thereof hereby revoking all and declaring utterly void all wills and testaments by me heretofore made in witness whereof I the said Aaron Moassingill do hereunto set my hand and seal this 24th day of December A.D. 1849.
