

Will of George Gully

In the name of God Amen I George Gully of the County of Johnston and State of South Carolina being of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be God do this sixtient day of September in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and twenty three make and publish this my last will and testament in manner following

First I give to my wife Zilphia Gully one bay horse and one bay mare one woman saddle one man saddle three bridles four bit and cales one work steer and one black steer ten head sheep one cart and wheels twenty five head of hogs all my gear two feather beds and furniture two chests one table and all my household and kitchen furniture of every kind and all my working tools that belongs to the plantation and all provisions now on hand and all the corn that is growing on the (placed) plantation wherein I now live with all the fodder except one eight part I give to my son Robert A. Gully of the cows and fodder and four hundred weight of seed cotton and all my flocks

Item I lend to my wife during her lifetime one negro man named Nathan and one woman named Cook and one named Anna and the land I do give to my son George Stevenson.

Item I give to my daughter Bethany Steinant one negro woman named Anna and her increase one bed and furniture two head of cattle four head of sheep one saddle one chest one sow and pigs all which she had received.

Item I give to my daughter Betsy Phillips one negro woman named Planner one bed and furniture three head of cattle four head of sheep one chit one saddle and bridle all which she has received.

Item I give to my daughter Sally Phillips one negro girl named Clarie one bed and furniture three head of cattle four head of sheep one saddle one chit all which she has received

Item I give to my daughter Zilphia one negro girl named Silva one bed and furniture and twenty five dollars in money.

Item I give to my son Robert Stevenson Gully one tract or parcel of land on the North side of Horse River joining the lands of Elias Barnes, Rubin Sanders and Dr Whites and William Watts and on the south side of Rocky Spring branch where my line and Rubin Sanders line crosses the said Rocky Spring branch then up the said branch to the Smithfield road thence a direct line rear and east course to George Wimberly's line to a corner stake near my place also one negro girl named Edith one bed and furniture one horse saddle and bridle and one half of my set of blacksmith tools to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give to my son George Stevenson Gully after the death of my wife all the remainder of my lands on the north side of the said Rocky Spring branch joining the lands of Rubin Sanders Josiah Watson and George Wimberly also one negro girl named Olife one bed and furniture one bay colt one new saddle one half of my set of blacksmith tools and one shot gun to him and his heirs forever.

Item All the ballance of cattle hogs and sheep I leave to be equally divided between my sons Robert Stevenson and George Stevenson and my daughters Zilphia Gully by three men whom they may choose

Item I lend the low ground plantation that I give to my son Robert Stevenson to my wife during her widowhood.

Item I give to my son Robert Stevenson one black walnut box.

Item I give to son George Stevenson one black walnut table.

Item I leave the land that bought of Josiah Steinant containing three hundred and fourteen acres lying on Buckhorn Swamp joining the lands of James Steinant to be sold in manner following to wit one half to be paid in six months the other half to be paid in twelve months and the money arising from the sale of said land to pay my debts and the twenty five dollars given to my daughter Zilphia and all the ballance of my property that is not named except my negroes to be sold and the money arising from the above named sale to be equally divided between my wife and all my surviving children except twenty dollars

I give to Elias Barnes to act as one of my executors.

Item⁵ My will is that - if either of any sons should die without and lawful heirs or before the coming of age that the land given to him shall be the property of surviving son.

Item⁶ My will is that - if either of my surviving children shall take one of the negroes already given them Bethany, Hannah, excepted they shall after the death of my wife have one of negroes that I have lent to her during her life the said negro to be as near the value of the deceased negro as can be ascertained by executors.

Item⁷ All the balance of my negroes that is not given away nor lent to my wife during her life, I lend to my wife during her widowhood and then to be equally divided between all my surviving children with the negroes lent to her during her lifetime and if there can not be an equal division without sale my will is that such part of the negroes or negro be sold so as to make the division equal.

Item⁸ I give unto my two grand daughters Eliza and Sarah this all the account I have against them provided they live to have and lawful heirs as many And I do hereby make and ordain my son Robert Barnes Gully and Elias Barnes executors to this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal the day and year above written acknowledged to be my own hand.

Will of Isaac Johnson

In the name of God Amen I Isaac Johnston of the County of Johnston and State of North Carolina being of sound mind and memory do hereby make publish and declare this instrument of writing to be my last will and testament in manner and form following that is to say

I give and devise to my son Stephen all the land I now own on the north side of the North fork of the Beaver Dam Branch including the house and plantation whereon I now live to him and his heirs forever reserving to ^{my wife} the use of the same during her natural life.

All the rest of my land I give and devise to my son Frederick to him and his heirs forever.

I give and bequeath to my said son Stephen one small filly one feather bed and furniture 1 shot gun and one half of my plantation tools.

I give and bequeath to my said son Frederick one mare and colt one feather bed and furniture one half of my plantation tools and all the hogs that is commonly called his.

I give and bequeath to my daughter Bethany one feather bed and furniture one cow and two yearlings one boar and gear half a dozen pewter plates, half dozen pewter bacon one iron pot and one spider and lid and one clothes chest all the balance of my household and kitchen furniture I give to my wife.

The residue of my property I wish to be sold by my executors herein after to be named and the money arising therefrom after paying all my just debts to be equally divided between my three daughters, Sally Betsy and Bethany.

I do hereby nominate and appoint my son Barney Johnson executor to this my last will and testament in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this the 24th day of December 1822.
