

Will of James Jackson.

In the name of God Amen I James Jackson of the County of Johnston and State of North Carolina being in perfect sound mind and memory and knowing that it is appointed for all men once to die I do make and declare this to be my last will and testament in manner and form following to which is my will, desire that all my just debts and funeral expense be discharged quick as possible out of the most perishable property of my estate by my executor after mentioned

I give to my beloved and obedient wife of my bosom all my lands and houses one hundred and seventy acres cattle hogs and sheep and geese and chickens and mackerel and of farming tools and household furniture corn and fodder cotton and pease to her and her heirs lifetime and widowhood which I leave any wife executor to this my last will and testament have by my knowledge disannulling and making void all former wills by me made. In witness whereof I the aforesaid James Jackson have hereunto set my hand and seal this the 10th day of February 1831. Sealed and delivered in the presence

Will of James Heimant.

In the name of God Amen I James Heimant of the State of North Carolina and County of Johnston being in perfect mind and memory blessed be God To this third day of February in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and thirty-one do make and publish this my last will and testament in manner and form following viz.

First I lend unto my beloved wife Martha Heimant all my lands on the west side of Buckhorn Swamp except the Jacob Greer land including my home plantation containing seven hundred and fifty five acres during her natural life and at her death I give all the lands before mentioned except the Jacob Greer land to my beloved son Randy Heimant to him and his heirs forever. I also lend unto my beloved wife Martha one negro man named George two negro women named Fleeter & Charity during her natural life and at her death I give unto my beloved daughter Elizabeth Heimant the negro woman Fleeter to her and her heirs forever.

Also at the death of my wife Martha I give unto my beloved daughter Martha Heimant the negro girl named Charity to her and her heirs forever.

I also give unto my beloved wife Martha Heimant my black mare and gray horse saddle & bridle two cows & calves two swine & pigs twenty five head of dry hogs ten head of sheep ten geese one feather bed and furniture all my kitchen furniture one loom and gear four plows and gear two grubbing hoes, two weeding hoes two axes one grind stone one pine chest two head of dry cattle all my bacon and lard on hand all my corn & fodder on hand to her and her heirs forever.

Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Elizabeth Heimant one feather bed & furniture one cow and calf also the sum of ten dollars.

Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Mourning Barnes one negro boy named Wandal during her natural life and at her death to belong to my beloved son William Heimant to him and his heirs forever.

Item I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Mary Heimant one negro boy named Sam one feather bed and furniture one cow & calf also the sum of ten dollars.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Ann Reimant one feather bed and furniture one cow and calf also the sum of ten dollars.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Martha Reimant one feather bed and furniture one cow and calf also the sum of ten dollars.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my beloved son Heandy Reimant the sum of ten dollars.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my beloved son Jessie Reimant one negro man named Lewis also the sum of one hundred dollars.

Item

I give and bequeath unto beloved son William Reimant one negro boy named Flancy one feather bed and furniture one shot gun also the sum of ten dollars.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my beloved daughter Rhoda Atkinson one negro girl named Amy also the sum of one dollar.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my ^{son} Adam H. Atkinson seventy-five acres of land lying on the east side of little Buckhorn Swamp called the Jacob Price Land to him and his heirs forever.

Item

I give and bequeath unto my five grand children Williamson, Meabiz, Lairy and Chally Reimant the sum of fifty dollars to be equally divided between them.

I also lend unto my four daughters Elizabeth, Mary, Ann and Martha Reimant three hundred and fourteen acres of land called the Phillips place during their lives and at their deaths to belong to my beloved son William Reimant to him and his heirs forever.

I also lend unto my beloved wife Martha Reimant one negro boy named Cusdy during her natural life and after her death to belong to my beloved son Heandy Reimant to him and his heirs forever.

All the rest of my property not before mentioned in legacies I leave to be sold at the direction of my executors and the profits arising therefrom with my notes and accounts to be applied to the payments of my debts and several legacies and incident charges of my estate and if any remaining to be equally divided between my wife and my nine surviving children or my surviving children at that time.

And I do hereby nominate and appoint my beloved son Heandy Reimant executor to this my last will and testament
