

Will of Phenebe Dodd.

In the name of God Amen I Phenebe Dodd of the County of Johnston and State of North Carolina being of sound mind and memory blessed be Almighty God for the same do this the twenty-third of March 1860 one thousand eight-hundred and sixty make and publish and declare this to be my last will and testament in manner and form following to wit:

Item 1st I give to my daughter Phenebe Dodd two feather beds & furniture her choice one bay mare and cart-all of my stock of hogs one cow and calf all of my sheep farming tools & kitchen furniture.

Item 2nd I give to my beloved daughter Phenebe Dodd my negro man Lewis to her and her heirs forever.

Item 3 My negro woman Emeline and all my other property not mentioned to be sold and the proceeds of said sale to be applied to the payment of my debts and the residue if there should be any left, I give to my daughter Phenebe Dodd to her and her heirs forever.

It is my desire that my neighbor and friend Baldy Sanders be executor to this my last will and testament revoking all former wills by me heretofore made by me the day and date above written. Signed sealed and written in presence of us

Item 2nd I give and bequeath unto my three sons David, Larkin & Edwin Batten one yoke of oxen one oxen cart wheels &c and one set of blacksmith tools to dispose of as they see proper.

Item 3rd I give and bequeath to my son Edwin Batten one shot gun and one metal clock.

Item 4th All the property not heretofore disposed of which I may have in my possession at my death I desire it to be sold on a credit of six months and after paying my debts if any to be equally divided between my three living daughters Fancy Garner, Trimmed Scuddin and Lucinda Brannan to them and their heirs forever.

I appoint my much beloved son Larkin O. Batten executor to this my last will and testament.
