

Will of William Hinton

In the name of God Amen I William Hinton of the State of North Carolina, and County of Johnston being of sound and perfect mind and memory blessed be God do this 20th day of March in the year of our Lord 1833 make and publish this my last will and testament in manner following that is to say.

Firstly I give and bequeath to my beloved son Hilyard Hinton Jacob Hinton James Hinton and Abel Hinton two hundred acres of land in the County and State aforesaid including the plantation wherein I now live to be equally divided between them my will further is that my beloved wife Tempy Hinton have the use and priviledge of the above mentioned land and plantation during her life time and then to be divided as above mentioned

Secondly I give to my beloved grand child Leemore Lillivant one cow and yearling

Thirdly My will is that all my stock of horses cattle hogs & sheep be sold and all my household and kitchen furniture and all my working tools and the money arising therefrom to be equally divided amongst all my children and my wife Tempy Hinton to have and equal share with my children in the stock and furniture above mentioned

Fourthly I give and bequeath to my beloved Tempy Hinton all my corn and bacon that I now have in hand for her support this year and I hereby make and ordain my beloved son Hilyard Hinton and my friend Stephen Neal my sole executors of this my last will and testament in witness whereof I the said William Hinton have to this my last will and testament set my hand and seal the day and year first above written.

Will of William Whitley Jr

In the name of God Amen I William Whitley Jr of the County of Johnston and State of North Carolina being weak in body but of sound and disposing mind and memory thanks be to God for the same do hereby make and ordain this instrument of writing to be my last will and testament in manner and form following to wit - first recommend my soul unto the God who gave it and my body to be buried in a Christian like manner at the discretion of my executors and as to this worlds goods the Lord has blessed me with I dispose of them in manner and form following to wit - I give and bequeath to my beloved wife Reely Whitley one certain tract or parcel of land bounded as follows beginning at Buffalo Swamp at the lower corner of the mill field at the north of a branch that divides my mill field from my other fields thence up that branch to the board above the millfield to the getting over place of the fence thence with the fence to the end of a ditch where it goes into the branch then with the fence on the side of the ditch up to the new ground fence thence with the new ground fence to corner near my exit near the wagon house thence along the lane the lane or path by the house where Richard Hoady lives to the upper corner of the little cotton patch and further along the path to my line adjoining William Hales land thence with my line and Hages line to Buffalo Swamp thence up the swamp to the beginning containing four hundred acres more or less also six negroes to wit - Cesar, Chezy, Emma, Harriet, Jackson and Annie also two horse creatures Nell and my Black mare and her colt - four cows and calves six sows and pigs fourteen sheep runs on the swamp and at the meeting house eight ewes and lambs one ram and the fell weather two bedsteads and furniture five chairs one side board and all that is on it one blue table walnut-worked and one safe two pots two cases of knives and forks two dishes twelve plates choice one spoon and gear one yoke of steers and cart-choice four water tubs two pail one can two plows and gear four cutters choice thirty seven dollars in eagle half dollars six barrels of sound corn eight blades stacks choice one choice stack two wheels and carts choice two painted chest to her during her lifetime and after her death her children to have one negro apiece Chezys children if she has as many the balance of the negroes if any to be divided between my first-wives children the balance after debts to be sold and equally divided among all her children except the lands and that to be equally among all her body children
