That Martha Smith, late of said county, is dead,
having made and published her last will and tes-
tament dated Jan. 13th, 1881, and that she thereby
appointed the said Freeman Smith her executor.

That said Freeman Smith desires to qualify as ex-
ecutor of said last will and testament.
That the value of the personal estate so far as can
be ascertained at the date of this application is
about one hundred dollars, and that Nancy Smith
and Lourenia Tindal are the legatees under said
will, and the said Freeman Smith respectfully
asks that said last will and testament be admit-
ted to probate according to law, and that he be ap-

Whereupon letters testamentary are issued to said Freeman Smith, as executor of the said last will and testament.

I, Martha Smith, of the county of Lenoir and state of North Carolina, being of sound mind and memory, but considering the uncertainty of my earthly existence, do make and declare this my last will and testament, in manner and form following, that is to say:

First, that my executor (hereinafter named) shall provide for my body a decent burial, suitable to the wishes of my relations and friends, and pay all funeral expenses together with my just debts, however and to whomsoever owing out of the monies that may first come into his hands as a part or parcel of my estate.

Item 1st give and bequeath unto my daughter, Nancy A. Smith one half of my tract of land in valuation also, two beds and furniture known as the beds that has heretofore been advanced to her. Also one half of my stock and poultry that may be on hand at any death; also, one chest known as the one that formerly belonged to my mother, Nancy Smith, also one clock.

Item 2d. I lend to my daughter, Louvenia Tindal, one half of my land during the term of her natural life time, and at her death, I give the said lands to her children, also, I lend to her and her children two beds and furniture,

Item 3d. I lend to my grandson Matthew Tindal anything and in the event he should die then in that event, I give it to my brother, Freeman Smith.

Item 4th. It is my desire that the residue of my property to be sold and the proceeds thereof to be equally divided between my two daughters, Nancy A. Smith and Louvenia Tindal. In testimony whereof, I do hereunto declare this to be my last will and testament and that I do hereunto set my hand and seal this January 13th day, 1881.
