First It is my will and desire that my executor hereafter named shall provide for my body a decent burial, are suitable to the wishes of my relatives and friends and pay my funeral expenses together with all my just debts, however and to whomsoever owing out of the first money that shall come into his hands as a part or parcel of my estate. Item I give and devise to my daughter Olivia M. Phillips my plantation situated in Lenoir County and State of South Carolina and the back side of New River adjoining the lands of E. D. And then after half I give and devise, together with the remainder of the half given to my father and mother, to my brothers and sisters namely A. J. Barberry, H. J. Barberry, M. O. Barberry, Ella Barberry and Minnie Barberry to have and to hold to hold to them and their heirs forever.

Item I give and bequeath all my house hold furniture and my wearing apparel to my daughter Olivia M. Phillips absolutely forever.
