In the Name of God Amen
I Philip Fry of the County of Lincoln in the
State of North Carolina being sick and weak
in body but of perfect sound and disposing mind
and memory do make & declare this my last will
& testament in the manner & form following
(Wiz) - First I give my son Philip the
plantation that I now live on containing about
200 acres to him for ever. I also give him a
Wagon, Iron harrow all the horse gear, killing
box, choice of one year's size choice of a plow &
all the ironing tools
Second I give unto my wife Susanna two good
beds two chairs & sharp all the kitchen furniture
the same sonnet man all the money she shall
have, she shall have possession of the house
during her entire life, if she should marry again
that this property shall be sold, equally divided
among all my children
Thirdly I give Philip that I owe to my wife 15
dollars as she wants it he shall ^{give} ~~pay~~ ^{the same}
10 pounds of sugar, 10 pounds of coffee, 10
bushels of corn, 10 bushels of wheat ~~he shall find~~
any hog to fatten, he shall find his land for
flax, cotton and potatoes as much as thought
sufficient after her death or widowhood, then
her property shall be sold & the money equally
divided among all my children also 50
dollars not made use of by her shall be
divided among all my children the money
that my son Philip pays for the ~~quicks~~

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heretofore mentioned shall be deducted out of the
\$50 dollars and I do hereby appoint my friend
John Reinhardt, & Daniel Burns executors of this
my last will and testament and hereby publicly
proclaimed and declare this to be my
last will and testament, whereunto I have
set my hand and seal this
thirtieth Day of April the Year of our Lord
1819
