 and declare off in the following form & manner item first my desire is that all
 my just debts to be paid honestly which then is true item I leave to my beloved
 wife Mary Cook the young of all my Estate of what kind & every thing
 her widowhood at the end of her widowhood I send the meadow plantation together
 with the land depending on the North line, running with roads to the South line
 together with all the land part of the Road containing her Widow's life after
 her death then to be Equally divided among my three all the land I leave at
 the end of her widowhood to be Equally divided among my three all the land I leave at
 the end of my Estate at the end of her widowhood to be sold and to be Equally divided
 among my heirs that is to say Eliza Cook Thomas Cook Peter Cook Samuel
 Cook My Sisters woman and Children my desire is that at the end of her
 widowhood that they be buried out till my youngest child comes of age then to
 be Equally be divided among my Children their names before written and
 I the said Francis Cook do nominate and appoint Nelson Whittier and Thomas Cook
 Executors to this my last Will and Testament Revoking any and sundry all other
 Wills heretofore made by me Revoking whereof I the said Francis Cook have
 hereunto set my hand and seal my last Will this 20th of March 1813

 unto Elizabeth Thersage one walnut table in laid & also one Volume of Henry's
 Explanation & also two table cloths one leather head bedstead & also two sheets
 one blanket one bolster & one pillow one stone Legg that holds three gossamer
 also one Canton dish one brass candle stick and one small flower stand
 Item I give & bequeath unto Elizabeth Cook one walnut table also one Lin
 hat one better hat & four head of gas and one Canton dish with a glass edged
 one case of knives & forks also one working wheel Item I give and bequeath unto
 my Brother John Whittier one steer and best one carrying knife & two stocks of
 hay Item I give & bequeath to Honina Day one fine chest my will is
 that the residue of my property be sold and after paying my debts
 the money arising from thence be Equally divided between my Brothers
 Benjamin & William Whittier and I hereby make and ordain my worthy
 friends Malachi Thersage & Henry Whittier Executors of this my last will
 and Testament in Witness whereof I the said John Whittier have to this my
 last Will & Testament set my hand and seal this day and year above written
 Legged sealed published and declared by the said John Whittier (and)
 Whittier the testator as his last will and Testament in the presence of us who
 were present at the time signing and being thereof warning in
 Henry & Malachi
